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Some of the Prominent Errors in The Church Today

" Do not err, my beloved brethren" James 11:16.

He who would insist that the Holiness movements have no room for any improvement whatsoever had better examine his own heart. In days gone by, we are told, the various Holiness movements, both large and small, could point to the modern and the old-line churches with a degree of seorn and enumerate their inconsistencies in a long list. It would appear that "those days are gone forever," as almost every pastor and evangelist has just enough "in his own backyard," as the expression goes, to attend to that he has no room to point at others. While we do deplore this condition, we are forced to admit its existence, much to the sorrow of a Holy God. An evangelist now in Heaven made the statement: "We'll have to watch our steps, or the Holiness movement will lose the precious 'move'." In many places this fear appears to be perfectly grounded, as standards drop lower and lower with every passing year. We would mention some of the prominent errors in the church today, as we see them after observation and study, with a prayer that they may be speedily remedied and the Church go marching on to glorious victory.

Error in our approach to the unsaved

One of the first things surely to happen in some churches, when some one is present who is unsaved, is that a special show is put on for their benefit. The local "clowns" try to outdo each other in racing for the prize seat on top of the piano, and jump over the seats, kicking people as they go, to run in and out of the doors—all to impress the visitors. When someone would object to this acting, the retort is: "They don't like the fire. We made it too hot for them." The truth of the matter was that probably

these professors had ruined every chance of ever helping these people to God. While we love, yes love and enjoy. Holy Ghost demonstration, (even if sinners and carnal folk speak against "getting blessed," we feel like David as he shouted God's praises at the return of the ark; if they insist, we will make ourselves even more 'vile' (?)) we do detest demon-stration. Amen. One fellow jumped all over his church building at one service, while his wife moaned that he was so mean to live with, and would not supply the necessities of the household. As a lad of fifteen I came to the Holiness Church, and was put under deep conviction by the demonstration of the saints, which was in the Spirit. Had they acted out of the Spirit's blessing that night, this scribe should never have returned to that church again. After all, beloved, how high a man jumps or how loudly he shouts does not determine his spiritual status. It is how he lives and walks with God.

As surely as some unsaved young man or woman enters the house of God wearing some jewelry, some well-meaning soul will feel a Divine (??) urge to tell them they can never go to Heaven or be saved until they strip off every ornament right then and there. This admonition is usually given in a loud manner so as to embarrass the innocent sinner. Small wonder that many go out, never to return. When conviction for such worldliness strikes the heart, the individual will line up. One wonders how long it took some of those pointing the finger of scorn at the sinner to clean up from their worldliness. Were we to question in this manner we would be "griev-

ing the Spirit." Oh, will people ever learn that God's Spirit is not grieved every time their finite human spirit is disturbed.

Again, the manner in which the pastor meets people as he visits and goes about his pastoral calls off-times decides for the success or failure of a church. If he is "stand-off-ish" he will win few: he may be too chummy and offend right-thinking people. May the Lord help us that we might "not err, my beloved brethren" in our aproach to the unsaved.

Error in the allocation of funds

Possibly we had better be silent on this issue were we to please some, but it is our duty to "ery aloud and spare not." The way the financial end of some churches is being conducted surely must bring grief to a Holy God. We see this in every department of the church. One evangelist had preached faithfully in a certain locality for a period of time; when the offering was lifted, his heart was touched for people that could not afford to give large offerings to show their gratitude to God and to him for his ministry among them. Imagine the evangelist's surprise when he was paid, for the offering consisted of but a very few dollars and everyone of them in silver. The evangelist drove away from the church, h's heart sweet and the blessing still intact in his soul, but his very inner man weeping that people should so betray his confidence and faith he had placed in them. What might have happened had those dear people who contributed so liberally out of their poverty found this situation to be true is only a matter of conjecture. Again, an evangel'st in the absence of the pastor, arose and passed out envelopes of his own issue, in order to supplement his offerings which already were sufficient, especially from that congregation. Offerings are received for missions, and never arrive at the field. Money is voted for this cause or that need, and someone puts it in his pocket. One pastor found the janitor stuffing the offerings from a small bank into his pockets. Truly, "The love of money is the root of all evil." "Do not err, my beloved brethren," in the allocation of funds.

Error in the altar services

We mention this last, not that it is not important, but that it may be left imprinted on our minds. A sinner enters our church or any church in the Holiness movement. With eagle eyes some dear professor of religion watches until the altar invitation, and then pounces on the weeping soul, and coaxes, begs,

threatens, pulls-and finally gives up. The sinner, his conviction now all gone, resolves never to return to that church again. It has been the experience of many evangelists and workers that when folk are under conviction in the old-time way, they need little coaxing or begging to seek God. Then, again, a touch on the shoulder, or a quiet word of invitation may bring some. Dragging and pulling someone from his seat is surely not the best way to help them to God. Dear reader, professor of God's grace, picture yourself in the position of the poor sinner. How would you like someone to get hold on you and pull, threaten, drag, and molest you to your great embarrassment, and the apparent glee of some other people sitting near you? Remember the Golden Rule here, please. A dear pastor aproached a sinner boy whose heart was bent low with conviction. In tears he begged the boy to come to the altar of prayer, but the young man did not come that night. Finally he was saved, and never forgot the invitation of the man of God, for it had been in the Spirit's wisdom and timing. One of the next things some folk expect is to have the seekers at the altar pray through the first time they come. Often times this may not be God's plan, as there may be confessions to make and restitutions to attend to, before God may save the soul that is seeking. Other grasp the seeker and sway him back and forth, with one worker yelling in one ear, "Let go," and another screaming in the other ear, "Hold on." The poor seeker is confused and may become discouraged and fail to go through, On the other hand, if the seeker is a "warmed over" or "baked over" type of habitual backslider, some good shaking may help him to realize he needs to do some praying for himself, as many of this type hang over the altar like a "hunk of liver" (an apology for the language, yet not it's description), and chew their gum, and fall asleep at the penitent form. Advice at an altar can be golden, if applied in the Spirit's wisdom and direction. One seeker moaned that no one seemed to care for her at all. Quick as a flash someone started the chorus, "No One Ever Cared For Me Like Jesus," and in a burst of glory she arose and shouted all over the church, and had the victory.

Some altar nurses and buzzards try to "talk peole through." The best way we have yet found is to allow them to "PRAY THROUGH CLEAR AND PRAY CLEAR THROUGH." In one altar service a graduate from a famous college, respected by all as a lighthouse to train youth for service, asked the evangelist, "Don't you ever instruct your seekers?"

Reader, when one the scene above shown Cuba, he finds it not hard to picture the account that the writer John gives of Jesus stopping by the well side. "Being wearied with his journey, sat thus on the well there cometh a woman to draw water."

John 4:6,7. Outside of the city of Bejucal, there is a settlement on government-owned land, where the poor people have built their homes. It was to this community that our missionary, Rev. Paul H. Eversole, and other helpers came to begin a church. At first there were many difficulties to be overcome, but finally, in answer to prayer and with the help of some American friends, a church was built on that hillside, and oh, how the poor Cuban people crowd in to hear the Gospel. There are no wells on the hillside, and the dear people have to carry all their water in used containers as the man is doing at the well in the picture. They carry their water up over the hillsides for several miles back away from the little foot paths. It is possible to stand by the well side and hand a tract or speak a word to every

family on the hill. Those little homes, constructed of crude lumber and with thatched roofs, have been host to the missionary and his helpers many times. They have also opened their hearts to the Saviour and He has given to them the joy of Salvation from the darkness of heathen practices and superstitions.

The writer remembers several winters ago when he and another minister visited this little church and conducted a revival meeting there. The people would bear us waiking up the path, and the native Christians would cry out, "Meeting tonight. Meeting tonight," as we walked back the rough path where no car could possibly go. When we arrived at the little church, and had placed the carbide light in position the crowds began to come, until the room was completely filled. What a wonderful time we had singing and preaching. How receptive and how responsive are these dear souls. Also, in other parts of the island, where our missionary is now working, trying to establish another base and headquarters, there is a great need for the Gospel. Some towns have churches but no preachers. Others have no place of worship. The people there are begging for missionaries and for churches.

Reader, close your eyes but for a moment, and see if you cannot see the dear natives of the island of Cuba, 4,000,000 strong, calling for the Gospel and for churches. Then, sit down, write

As we continue the study of John's Patmos vision of Christ, it is very important that we keep well in mind the facts of the lesson being discussed; so it is advisable that before reading this, that time is taken to refresh the mind by carefully reading the lesson, Rev. 1:10-18, the descriptive account of what John heard and saw. It is very important also, if we desire to make the truths applicable (and it will all profit little, if this is not the objective) to remember that at the very outset, he said, "I was in the Spirit (under the anointing or in fluence) on the Lord's day, (or the day of the Lord) and heard and saw." Where there is no vision the people perish; and a Spirit-less individual or Church will also be a vision-less individual or Church; had he not been able to say, "I was in the Spirit," neither could be have said, "I heard and saw."

The divine purpose behind all of this was not to furnish John with a little entertainment while on the barren lonely isle, but it was a call to action. First, I was in the Spirit, and consequent upon this, I heard a voice, I turned and saw, and the voice said, "write." God does not give us the Holy Ghost simply to make us feel good and to entertain us. There are plenty of those yet who would like to see the kingdom restored and sit in prominent positions on his right hand and on his left hand, but, ye shall receive POWER, the HOLY GHOST coming upon you, and YE SHALL BE WITNESSES UNTO ME.

Passing up and down the thoroughfares of that ancient city of Athens, we are told, Paul's spirit was stirred in him when he saw the city wholly given to idolatry. As a result of what he saw, and that stirred spirit, he soon stirred somebody else, and as we read his marvelous Mars Hill sermon, our hearts too become stirred by the fire that still burns in those truths. How every preacher, every layman should have those repeated times to which they can ever look back and say, I was in the Spirit, and heard and saw. With this

in mind we will pass on to note what follows.

We have observed Him clothed as our high Priest, girt with a golden girdle, denoting not only glory and beauty, but strength; also that His hairs were white like wool, as white as snow. This brings us to the statement,

His eyes were as a flame of fire.

Fire is the most penetrating thing we have; it pierces and reduces. For Him to have eyes like a flame of fire must speak of His omniscience. When here upon earth He needed not that any should testify of man: for He knew what was in man. In the Gospels, how frequent the statement, "and He, knowing their thoughts," said thus and so. Yes, His eye can reach all distance, rise to all heights, descend to all depths and enter all concealment. There is not a thought in our hearts, but lo, He knoweth it altogether.

Herr Him as He addresses the church in Thyatira, Rev. 2:18. "These things saith the Son of God, who hath his eyes like a flame of fire, and his feet are like fine brass." Again in verse 23, "I am he which searcheth the reins and hearts." In His placing such emphasis upon this it is evident He would have this fact ever before us. What a solemn truth this is; there is not a thought that flits with lightening speed across a single mind, that is not as clearly seen by God and registered above as I am this moment writing these words and you shall soon be reading them. This must also have its meaning. The Bible has much to say about brass and its many uses, but we shall only speak of it as it has to do with the lesson before us. In a number of Scriptures it is spoken of to denote strength and endurance; such as Psa. 107:16, "For he hath broken the gates of brass, and cut the bars of iron in sunder;" again Isa. 45:2, will break in pieces the gates of brass, and cut in sunder the bars of iron." The thought implied in both places of course is, gates of great strength, not easily trodden down. It all speaks of His strength, and that though He was crucified in weakness, He was raised in power; and though this is the time of His humiliation, it will not always be so. Hence for His feet to be as brass, implies, that in due time He will tread down His enemics and will be the final VICTOR.

The book of Revelation presents Him to us in its opening chapter as the one who was dead and is alive, and dressed in His high priestly robes as our intercessor, but ends up with Him as KING of KINGS and LORD of LORDS. The Father's pledge to Him was, "Sit thou on my right hand, until I make thine enemies thy footstool." The Prophet Isaiah visioned His coming thus, in chapter 63:1-2 "Who is this that cometh from Edom, with dyed garments from Bozrah? this that is glorious in his apparel, travelling in the greatness of his strength? Why Become A Christian Early in Life??

Ecclesiastes, Chapter 12

This is an unusual exposition of Ecclesiastes, Ch. 12, and it is our prayer that all readers, especially the youth, will give heed to the thoughts here prayerfully presented.

The question is asked, "Why should one become a Christian early in life?" Often we have heard that one should sow his wild oats, have his fling, and then settle down to be a Christian. Many have put a premium upon wrong-doing in early life by exalting stories of the lowest depth. But we must remember that what we sow in early life we will reap in later years whether we get religion or our life is lived in sin. Pay day is coming some day.

- (1) One should become a Christian early in life before the keeper of the house shall tremble—the keeper of the house is our nervous system—before one gets palsied, wobbly or feeble, he should give his heart and life to the Lord or Creator. It is the admonition of the writer of the book of Ecclesiastes. He was getting old and coming down to the end of the way; he was summing up his life, giving warning and wholesome advice for those after him to follow. He said for one to become a Christian before his nerves go to pieces and his steps become uncertain.
- (2) Also, The Old Preacher said that one should become a Christian early in life before he was bowed over, his back bent, his chest sunken, his shoulders stooped. When this condition exists few come to the Lord—only one in 80,000 after reaching middle life, we are told.
- (3) Then the writer of Eccles astes says that one should become a Christian before his eyes begin to go bad, before those that look out of the windows be darkened, that is before the transition comes, and one has to wear glasses. He cannot even see to read the Bible or Spiritual reading matter. Every person should remember His Creator and give his life to the highest and best living.
- (4) Again, before one's hearing goes bad and his voice becomes weak, he should give his heart to the Lord. "The doors shall be shut in the streets... sound of grinding is low." Don't wait until your hearing is bad, and your voice is so low it is scarcely heard.
- (5) "He shall rise up at the voice of the bird"—
 the old writer is saying that one should be a Christian, before sleep is robbed from his eyes, and he is
 unable to rest. Wonderful advice.

- (6) "The almond tree shall flourish" —that is before one's locks turn gray and remind you of the almond blossoms. It is the sane and wise thing to become a Christian. The writer is saying to get salvation early in life. Don't act in a foolish way, until old age and death are staring you in the face and your hair is white.
- (7) Before death comes in and the silver cord be loosed. It is risky business to wait for a death-bed repentance, although it may be possible. Why give God the ragged end of a mis-spent life. Choose ye this day whom ye will serve. Save a child and you save a multiplication table: save an adult and you only save one unit. It is better to build a fence around the top of the precipice and save a child before he falls over, than it is to build a hospital at the bottom. Hear the conclusion of the whole matter: Fear God and keep His commandments: For this is the whole duty of man. For God shall bring every work into judgment, with every secret thing, whether it be good, or whether it be bad.
