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True Manliness

"Show thyself a man." I Kings 2:2.
"Quit you like men." I Cor. 16:13.
The subject of true manliness is worthy of our consideration, especially when we think of who spoke the above mentioned texts, namely David and Paul, and of the great need of true manliness in the Christian ranks today. This subject stands out bold-

Rev. T. Wise thrilled the heart of the composer, and inspired the heart of the poet.

We never grow weary in speaking its praises; the pen of the historian never ceases to record its noble deeds. The father admires it in his son, and the son admires it in his father. Every young man of good reason aspires to it, and every young woman almost adores it in a young man.

"Show thyself a man," but remember true manliness does not consist in the strength and size of the human body. This may be the idea of some individuals, but this is not what David was thinking about. It is true physical strength may add dignity to true manliness as in the life of Saul, who was head and shoulders higher than his people, Israel. I Samuel 9:2. But true manliness is more than this. When the president of ancient France was seeking a leader to defend his people, Napoleon stepped forward and offered his services; but, when the President saw his size, he doubted his ability, but physical size or strength was not the secret of Napoleon's success.

Nor does it consist in intellectual greatness. We cannot limit true manliness to the possession of a great intellect. It was said that Cyrus the Great knew the name of every soldier in his army, but this great grace is more than that, however convenient that may be. And I am glad that we are not responsible for the lack of great talents, but only for the culture and the use which we make of what we have. You need not be discouraged, my friend, nor think that you cannot be a true man, because you have not been gifted with great physical strength or a great

intellect.

Nor does true manliness consist in chafing under restraint. It is no common thing to find people today who seem to think an independent disregard of authority and wholesome regulations is manly, and when constrained to submit to such authority feel their domain of liberties has been invaded. Peter reminds us of this class when he says in II Peter 2:10 "(They) despise government. Presumptuous, are they, self-willed,...not afraid to speak evil of dignities." This unmanly feeling manifests itself, first in the home and then in public. Therefore, true manliness is not disobedience to parents, not disobedience to teachers or ones in authority, not disobedience to the laws of the land, not quarreling with unavoidable relations, not even being impatient under them, but it is living in peace and harmony with them.

Nor does true manliness consist in imitating the conduct of others or measuring themselves among themselves. II Cor. 10:12. There are many great men who, notwithstanding their greatness, have their peculiarities and defects. And it is a well-known fact, too many times, they who make imitation their practice, imitate the defects of others. Many of the admirers of Alexander the Great imitated his intemperance, and not his liberality.

Nor does true manliness consist in following popular opinion, right or wrong, and many times, wrong. Jesus said, "When the blind lead the blind, both shall fall into the ditch." The world is full of men who either have not the brains enough or are too lazy to investigate for themselves, who are content to be found in the party lines on the popular side. They are not troubled too much with questions of right or wrong, either in religion or in politics. Nor, on the other hand, does true manliness consist in a reckless disregard for the opinions of others. It is not manly to say: "I don't care what others think of me." We should care, and every TRUE man does.

"Is there any word from the Lord? And Jeremiah said, There is " Jeremiah 37:17.

Picture the anxious wait outside an operation room: figures, bowed with trouble and grief, pace the hospital corridors or sit restlessly on the waiting room bench. Suddenly there is the sound of a door's being opened: nervous voices quickly tremble out the inquiry: "Is there any word?" This scene is being repeated many times over the land in hospitals and clinies. God grant that in the midst of this physical perplexity and concern, we might not overshadow the spiritual concepts so vital to the soul. Commentators and news-casters glow with their reports over every radio and television station. But through the darkness of an Atomic world so full of gloom and suspicion we hear, "Is there any word from the Lord?" Brother Jeremiah found himself in just such a position, upon his release from prison by the new king Zedekiah, who was the successor to Jehoiakim. His two scrolls of messages from God-written by the scribe Baruch-were destroyed, but Zedekiah shows his great confidence in Jeremiah by secretly inquiring concerning a message from the Holy One of Israel. There must have been some reasons why the king had such confidence in the boyprophet. It is plain to see the following were some

of his outstanding traits of character: (1) He lived close enough to God to hear Him speak a message. (2) He was not easily discouraged. (3) He could endure the dungeon without complaining. (4) He delivered a true message. Compare Jeremiah with the D. D.'s of this age. Quite a difference, what! As to the word from the Lord today, let the Scriptures give us an inkling of the message.

WORD FROM THE LORD CONCERNING REPENTANCE

"Repent ye therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out, when the times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord." (Acts 3:19). These were the words of the evangelist Peter, as he fervently declared the doings of his God. How we need to preach this message of Repentance. No one needs to repent anymore than many standing behind the sacred desk. Rev. G. W. Ridout declared in a message in the Pentecostal Herald: "There are hundreds, perhaps thousands, of preachers today who need to get converted all over again. It often happens that good men brought up in the church and trained in the schools enter the ministry just as John Wesley did, without an experience of the new birth." It is heartening in these awful days of trifling with God and light to see men like Jeremiah, who would not budge from his stand.

WORD FROM THE LORD CONCERNING RESPONSIBILITY

On the top of the list is the RESPONSIBILITY TO PRAY. Paul declared in his advice to young Timothy: "I will therefore that men pray everywhere, lifting up holy hands, without wrath and doubting." (I Tim. 2:8). Truly there are more things wrought by prayer than this world can ever imagine. When we reach heaven it will be quite an item when we realize that PRAYER has played such a large part in the success of the Kingdom of God on earth. Of course there is the RESPONSIBILITY TO PROVE OUR FAITH IN OBEDIENCE, for the Scriptures have plainly stated: "If we live in the Spirit, let us also walk in the Spirit." A Spiritfilled walk will do much to convince the world of the reality of Old-Time Religion. Another part in our obligation is found in the RESPONSIBILITY TO PROVIDE FOR THE NEED OF GOD'S WORK. The Testimony of an Empty Seat

"Thou shalt be missed, because thy seat will be empty" I Samuel 20:18.

These words were spoken by Jonathan, son of King Saul, to his friend and bosom companion, David, whose life King Saul sought opportunity to take, as he was jealous of the young man's military attainments. Jonathan loved David very deeply, as we read, "He loved him as his own soul" (Ch. 18: 3). David, realizing his danger, said to his friend, "There is but a step between me and death." The two young friends had met together the day before the new moon, which was the first day of the lunar month, and a holy day. There was a special procedure on this day, which consisted of offering the daily sacrifices, plus two young bullocks, a ram. seven lambs, a special meat and drink offering, and a kid for a sin offering. The trumpet was blown and all work ceased. It was a great occasion. It was David who spoke the words, "Tomorrow is the new moon, and I should not fail to sit with the king at meat: but let me go, that I may hide myself in the field unto the third day at even." Jonathan was to "feel out" his father at the end of three days to see it it were safe for David to come back to the king's house. As the young musician who slew the great giant was about to go, they embraced one another and Jonathan remarked in the language of the text, "Tomorrow is the new moon and thou shalt be missed, because thy seat will be empty."

GROUPS THIS TESTIMONY AFFECTS

Empty seats are silent testimonies in the home. Oh, the sadness and homesick feeling that filled the hearts of fathers and mothers, wives and children, during the years of World War II. The empty chair where "Daddy" sat to eat, and the place he sat to read gave silent assent to the truth of how much he was missed. Even now with peace-time conscription, many a mother's boy is missed because his seat is empty. Then there are the empty seats of loved ones passed away. How a homesick, sad, feeling creeps over the soul of the writer as he looks at Father's old rocker beside the kitchen stove, where the one he loved always sat in the evening. There is his empty chair at the end of the table, where he sat to eat, and from where he lifted up his voice to God in thanksgiving for the food provided. Yes, I miss him because his seat is empty. Then there is always that seat where a mother knitted by the window, while the playful kitten rolled the ball of yarn about.

Now mother has gone from the home, and she is missed because her seat is empty.

I think of the other empty seats. They are the ones in the church. There are no "Amens" or shouts from the empty pews. Where your seat is empty in church you are missed in many ways. First of all the brothers and sisters in the church miss you. How many times have I seen the discouraged look on someone's face when some seats were empty that should have been occupied. Oh, how we need each other's fellowship in these awful days. Let us be faithful! The brothers and sisters in the church not only miss your fellowship but they miss your prayers. The voice that you know should have come from your seat is now silent when voices are lifted together in prayer. They also miss your testimony, when testimony meeting is in progress.

Again, Jesus misses you if your pew is empty in church. Each one has his part in the service. Jesus wants you to be faithful to the house of the Lord. Also, the pastor misses you when your pew is empty. There is no nod of the head, no "Amen" to encourage the pastor when he most needs it, while the Devil is whispering discouraging things in his ears.

GRAVITY THIS TESTIMONY PRESENTS

While it is true the empty seat is a SILENT TEST-IMONY it speaks in tones no man can stifle. It testifies to those in the church that you have lost interest in the things of God. They become concerned about you and this concern many times robs the meeting of the glory that should be there. Your empty seat testifies to the world that you have cooled-off, and that you are luke-warm instead of on fire for God. Remember lukewarmness is sickening to God. It also testifies that you are more interested in worldly things than you are in the things of God. An empty church seat further testifies of a disobedience to a Scriptural Commandment, "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is" (Hebrews 10:25). Someone says, "I listen to a good radio sermon. I don't need to go to church." Listen, brother, God says not to forsake the assembling of ourselves together, and that doesn't mean sitting at home by the radio. One of the great desires God gave me when He saved my soul was to go to church, and after being saved 12 years, the desire is stronger than ever. Praise God! Lastly, I note that empty seats testify of latter days. "For that day shall not

A News Letter From The Field

Dear Christian Friends:

Greetings in the name of Him who gave Himself for us.

Since I last wrote you, God has done much for us. We were in the house of Antonio Carrillo for over three weeks. It rained a great deal during this time and we were shut in, but finally began to look for a house, and found one in Lindero, where we already had a work started. We moved here on December 12 to this home, which has two rooms a large hall-like room that we use for services, and a small one where we live. Upon arrival we at once set to work to fix up our living quarters. As our house has a palm thatch roof, we got a broom on a long pole, and swept down the cob webs from the inside of the roof. Then we had to think of furniture. We had purchased a kitchen table, so I built a cupboard and hung it on the wall over the table. We also made a clothes closet and put up some shelves. All these things are not completed at this writing, but are well under way. We also have a kerosene cookstove and two lamps. We had brought a folding table with us and two folding canvas chairs and a folding army cot. We bought another cot and thus we were able to get along until we got our bed, an American one, for which we are very glad. Later we bought four "taburetes," which are strong Cuban chairs covered with cowhide with hair on, and are very serviceable. Today, we plan to go to Holgium and get some curtain material and "dress" our house up a bit.

We are getting fairly well settled and are looking forward to the winter's work. We are hoping to have a good revival here this winter. There was a good crowd here last night, and when the services were dismissed the people remained seated. It seemed that they did not want to go. May God bless them and open their hearts to the Gospel.

Back of our house and joining it is another house. We call it the "kitchen." It is a big shell of a house with no divisions in it, and we store some of our things there. The roof leaks in some places and it has a dirt floor. We also use it for the wash house. It had a big charcoal stove in it and the other day we attempted to move it and the stove fell apart. We went to town and bought a charcoal grate that just fits in a five gallon square tin can. So we made a stove for washing.



The truck has been sitting outside, sometimes in the yard and sometimes in the road, so the owner of the house said something about putting the truck into the "kitchen." Friday, one of the boys came and told me that he could help me, so we knocked out a section of the wall of the "kitchen," and put in another removable section. We tied it with wires for the time being, and expect to put hinges on it later. It is a little difficult to take the wall out of the "kitchen" and take the truck out and then take it out again to put the truck back. At least we have the truck inside.

As we said, it has rained a great deal and we have not been able to get around much in the country. Now, we trust the weather will settle and we will be able to get about better. The roads are very bad and it takes lots of gasoline for the truck. The roads are so muddy in some places that many times we must go in low gear or second.

We covet your prayers that much may be done this winter in the salvation of lost souls here. The Cuban work depends upon the Cubans really praying through and being converted. We hope to see some of them pray through to victory in the meetings soon to be held. We are expecting some of the brethren from Pennsylvania to be with us. Join with us in prayer for a great revival campaign.

Dangers To Deep Spirituality

"Wherefore let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall." I Cor. 10:12.

In a fallen world like this, there can be nothing good that does not have its special enemies. The closer a soul lives to God, the more subtle are the dangers and difficulties to be overcome. To help those who want to live a life of constant fel-

lowship with God, we want to notice some of the points of danger to a spiritual life.

THE DANGER OF GETTING INTO BONDAGE TO OUR OWN RELIGION

In passing through a crisis of great crucifixion and yielding up to God, the mind is apt to get directed to some human measurements of sanctity, or the imitating of some other good person, such as the preacher you were saved under, and, under the tension of the hour, make rash vows, which are afterward impossible to carry out or are even unscriptural. Other souls are in danger of being in bondage to religious scruples, and nothing will more completely hinder the soul than this unfortunate situation since it is the policy of Satan to have folk substitute scruples for conscience. There is a world of difference between Scripture-enlightened conscience and the fictitious conscience, which is in constant dread of a thousand imaginary sins. A scrupulous person is constantly tormenting himself by asking, "Shall I eat this or that? Shall I drink this or that? Shall I wear this, with its extra buttons or lace? Could I ride a Pullman with the Lord's approval, or must I take a coach and give the money to Missions, since some preacher missionary said so? Shall I make a fire on Sunday to keep warm? Can I use perfume?" ... and so on ad infinitum concerning a lot of other seruples which the Bible does not mention or touch on, but leaves to our common sense. A preacher who had to cross a ferry to preach at his church listened one Sunday morning to the enemy whisper, "You've crossed the ferry on Sunday; you're backslidden." He went to church that morning and told his people he was backslidden, and asked them all to come and pray with him. He finally discovered it was only the Devil trying to make a laughing stock of him. If a soul gets into bondage to his own Holiness, there is no telling what foolish extremes their scruples will carry them. Many have done nothing wrong in the

sight of God, yet come to a big doubt as to their experience with God, because of some notion. It is possible to tangle our thinking until our spiritual lives become one big maze of DO'S and DON'T'S, instead of a peaceful walk with Christ. If souls depend on personal religion, God will find some way to smash the idol, as He wants us to love Him, instead of our own yows or our Holiness.

THE DANGER

OF A SPIRIT OF EXCLUSIVENESS

This is the spirit of thinking we have to have persons that have been saved as long as ourselves for our close association. This results in a grouping together with these people into a clique, where only charter members' views are accepted. It is admitted that this danger faces the spiritual people of all ages, but when we get into deeper union with God and our whole lives are dissolved in love, we can have an ocean of sympathy for those in any degree of grace, even if some are not on the way as long as we are, or have the degree of light that has come our way.

THE DANGER

OF ASPIRATION TO LEADERSHIP

If a soul is useful, he must be in some sense a leader of souls. People, who at one time were so humble that it was a cross to assume leadership even in a Y. P. meeting or a Prayer Meeting, become accustomed to being at the front in the meetings and finally come to the conclusion that they are born leaders, and should always be in an office of some sort; this leads to "wire-pulling." I have heard some say the church was cooling-off because they were not elected, seeing they counted themselves the most spiritual. Again, this spirit leads to self-complacency, so that there is a secret joy in the exercise of authority, and there is a cutting-off of everyone that would cross or hinder them from exerting their full authority (1). When this is manifest in preachers of the Gospel, it develops into a dietatorship so that people cannot go to visit a revival without seeking permission, or else lose (?) grace from their hearts. The only person who is fit to be a spiritual leader is one whose heart is not the least set upon it, and who fills the place of a leader with a meek spirit, utterly free from envy and jealousy, and who secretly trembles with every additional power conferred upon him. Keep in a place where there is none of self, but Christ living in the soul, until it can be said

THE DANGER OF RELIGIOUS LEGALITY

In other words there are souls who are so eager to grow in grace that they want to be extra good, by being extra plain or extra old-fashioned. They will take extra pains to make themselves look odd, or as they call themselves, "speckled birds." feel that the plain old-fashioned Holiness of loving God with all their hearts is not enough, for they are inclined to take on things that will indicate a higher religion, whereupon such souls become prey to a whole pack of Satan's hounds. They soon run back into Judaism. It is just as wrong to take up the fashions and fads of years gone by, as to do the same with those of today. One preacher was told he should not wear a neck tie, for Wesley never wore one. The preacher replied, "No, Wesley never wore a tie, but he did wear a POWDERED WIG." Some of the women will go around boasting, "I had the longest dress there at the camp meeting," as if that made them the holiest; it isn't the outward appearance that counts as much as does the hidden man of the heart, and people notice it without your having to call attention to it or boast of it. Paul mentions this type that get into bondage to new moons, sabbaths, and to various baptisms, as well as to their food and clothes. He remarked that he was afraid for them lest all his labors among them would be in vain. There are hundreds of just such poor, silly sheep today, who think they must jump out of the clover field of pure, boundless love to God and their fellows and get into a briar patch of outward legalism in order to show-off their extra piety. But they invariably lose their sweet peace, and become argumentative, distressed in mind, confused in faith, and wear a haggard look on their faces.

THE DANGER

OF THE SPIRIT OF "TOUCHINESS"

This is manifested by a feeling of being "miffed" or of being "hurt" when corrected or warned by a friend. When a man gets to the place where he will

not receive criticism or advice from his elders, he has lost all his usefulness in God's service. In every single gathering there are, or seem to be, people who are very bright in religious experience, yet are incapable of receiving sober counsel as to some blunder, and become vexed or sullen. Such persons need a revelation from God that the only cure for being "miffed" is to be utterly dissolved in Divine charity, where we love God and everybody with such a sweet and impartial spirit, that we care nothing for our own feelings and can receive advice and reproof from others in real humility and thanksgiving.

There are many other dangers that beset the pathway of the soul as we journey up the mountains of grace, but if we constantly avoid all the foregoing evils, we will rapidly take on the image of Christ Jesus, and lead many others to Him. May this all our ransomed souls engage in a never-ending fight to make Heaven our home.

II Timothy 2:15: "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

Paul in his letter to his son in the Gospel reminds Timothy of his ministerial duties and the great respensibility that rests upon every God-ealled minister and evangelist. In order to safeguard himself and the church against false teachers and erroneous doctrines which sought to undermine and to captivate the minds and hearts of the young converts, Timothy is encouraged to both search and study the Scriptures, and to absorb the Word of Life into his own heart until he was able to rightly divide the Word of God, separating truth from error. The atheist's doctrine is seemingly scriptural and taken from the Bible. (Ps. 14:1).."There is no God"). This has been the foundation upon which Voltaire, Paine, and all other atheists have stood. A recent news reporter stated we have a million such atheistic. God-defying people in the U.S.A. However, they have failed to read the entire verse, which reads as follows: "The fool hath said in his heart, there is no God." To quote this would place them in the catagory of a fool. The writer has in his possession a letter written by an atheist which is too vile for publication. However, I feel it would be well to pass along a few statements, which may help our ministers and evangelists to know more fully how to cope and attack this false doctrine which has originated in the pits of Hell. The writer of this letter claims God was an adulterer, Mary a fallen woman, and Jesus the son of a prostitute. How can our nation live and enjoy the blessing of a righteous God and dovetail and coincide with Communism and its allies?

The Wise man in Proverbs 6:27, 28, confronts the reader with a vital question: "Can a man take fire in his bosom, and his clothes not be burned? Can one go upon hot coals, and his feet not be burned?" The question conveys an impossibility to our hearts and minds and also infers there is danger of compromising Bible standards to make our church popular. The chaotic condition of our nation can largely be attributed to a fallen ministry. Congregations will never rise above their leaders and spiritual advisers. The eyes of the present-day prophets are no longer dimmed with tears. The cry, "Oh God, give me souls ere I die," is no longer the cry of their

hearts. The sheep are turned over to the world, the prayer services discontinued, while the pastors go to the club house, bowling allies, card parties, and theatres. The Ladies Aid is left to put on soup suppers, rummage sales, and the like to help support the church, as the sheep are under-nourished and unable (or unwilling) to produce sufficient wool to keep up the running expense of the church.

The yardstick of truth has been shortened, the old landmarks uprooted, standards lowered, until the church and the world appear very much alike. Socials, suppers, and games have been substituted to attract our young folk until the very Spirit Himself has been barred from the church. One pastor said it was very difficult for him to retain his position as pastor and cry against the popular sins of the day, as his congregation was largely made up of sin-loving people. Much depends on whether the minister is a hireling, or a God-called and Spirit-filled preacher. How different are many of the big D. D.'s of this day and age from what Paul admonished his pupil to be: "I charge thee therefore before God. and the Lord Jesus Christ, who shall judge the quick and the dead at his appearing and his kingdom: Preach the Word; be instant in season, out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine. For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine; but after their own lusts, shall they heap to themselves teachers, having itching ears; And they shall turn away their ears from the truth, and shall be turned unto fables."

In these days of ever changing scenes when king doms are tottering and the governments of man are crumbling, it is refreshing to think of something that is steadfast and secure.


