

Holiness Must Be Preached

Holiness must be preached; God has appointed a ministry for that very purpose (Eph. 4:11, 12). The great object of the Gospel is to make men holy. Sin has corrupted their hearts, paralyzed their intellects, and perverted their wills. It has insinuated itself into their most secret thoughts and feelings, usurped the control of their passions, antagonized and broken down a thousand purposes of virtue, and exposed them to hell. This is all offensive to God. Hence, in the provision of the Gospel, He proposes to pardon, not in part, but "from all unrighteousness." To accomplish this work, He appoints ambassadors (minister of His grace), and puts the Bible into their hands, as the great declaration of terms upon which men may be saved from all sin. They are authorized to offer freely, pardon to the guilty, regeneration to the (spiritually) dead, adoption to the alien, and sanctification to the impure. They are by no means at liberty to adopt any other standard. They may not refer to themselves as the rule, and offer only so much salvation as they themselves have experienced. God never made poor man the measure of His proffered grace. We must preach the whole Gospel; we must "declare the whole counsel of God," "whether men will hear, or forbear," though in our denunciations of all sin we should severely condemn ourselves.

We make no gospel; we originate no message; we have no discretionary powers as to what we shall preach, what offers we shall make or withhold from the world. It is God's Message — every word of it is His; and at the peril of souls we may not add to nor take from

it one iota of what He has sent us to declare. We must tell guilty sinners that if they will "seek the Lord while he may be found, and call upon him while he is near, he will abundantly pardon"; though morally dead, as generated men, they may be spiritually regenerated, "born again," made alive though the power of the Holy Spirit; though "aliens and foreigners," they may be "brought nigh by the blood of Christ"; that "God will send forth the Spirit of his Son into their hearts," enabling them to cry, "Abba, Father"; and we must declare to the adopted that it "is the will of God, even your sanetification"; that it is their imperative duty to "love the Lord God" with all their hearts; that "the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth from all sin."

All this must be done, not by hints, not timidly, nor so mixed and covered up as that men will not be likely to see these grand points in systematic and experimental theology but that they may have a definite view of them, and feel the power of their attractions, and the full force of their respective and united claims, with such clearness, such pathos and energy, so often repeated and urged with tender expostulations and tears; with such unction from God, with authority and power as will move the great deep of the heart, fix every one of them distinctly in the mind, and draw out the whole being in earnest seeking for them.

Seven Obstacles To Church Growth

by Lyle G. Parker

Churches finding themselves in a low production cycle should engaged in an analysis of the "soil" to see how the situation might be improved. Here are some areas of difficulty which deserve watching:

VICTIMS of DEFEATISM -

 A church fails to grow when its leaders become victims of defeatism. When a fatalistic attitude of unbelief prevails, faith for revival and growth dies, and in discouragement, pastor and people say, "It can't be done!" Some find support for this attitude in their interpretation of scripture portions: "There shall be a falling away"; "the love of many shall wax cold." To them, church growth is impossible because "the times" are against it!

Some say that America has had her chance, and now can expect only judgment. But what about the whole new generation of young Americans, many of whom have never seen revival? They need a chance!

While some prophecies foretell the Great Apostasy, others proclaim a last-day outpouring of God's Spirit. Both events are going to take place, and perhaps they will occur side by side. While we are on the earth, God is glorified in our producing much fruit. A positive stand of faith is essential to church growth.

LOSS of MOBILITY -

 Some churches fail to grow because they have lost their mobility, and have become prisoners of their buildings. They have reduced their activities to those things they do within the four walls of the sanctuary.

Many churches have withdrawn from areas where new contacts are made; they no longer hold street meetings, cottage prayer meetings, jail services, or visitation campaigns; so their groups are isolated from the world they should be reaching. In some instances, almost the only effort to reach the outside world is in the evangelistic campaigns with a guest

speaker. If people come, fine! If not, what more can they do?

The Early Church carried on without any particular emphasis on church buildings. The early disciples preached in the Temple, on the streets, in houses, in schools, and wherever opportunity afforded; so also in the early days of the Pentecostal outpouring. Services were held in homes, in store-front buildings, in vacant church buildings, in schools - anywhere an opening could be obtained. More recently, we have sometimes allowed our nice new church buildings to seal us off from the world which we must reach! For a church to grow, it must regain its mobility.

"FAMILY-CLAN" MENTALITY -

3. A third situation which hinders church growth might be called a "family-clan" mentality. This was illustrated in one Central American church made up entirely of Indian people. The society in that area was built around the family-clan principle. The church grew rapidly for a while. then its growth leveled off, and there were no new converts. Upon inquiry, I learned that all the converts were members of one family-clan. When the church affiliation reached the limits of the clan, growth ceased. In fact, it is possible that the members would not have welcomed additions from other families, since it would have disturbed the security of those in control.

The same thing has happened to a lesser degree in other places where the church is made up of two, three, or four families. These families may become sealed off from the rest of the community. Then, there are no more "bridges of God."

A church needs new material. Revival, like fire, burns low if it has no new material to feed upon. God expects us to find ways to move out of our isolation and into contact with the world. We are the salt of the earth. God is not calling us to isolation, but to contagion. We must expose the world to to Gospel.

"PASTOR-DO-IT-ALL" MEN-

4. A fourth hindrance to church growth is a "pastor-do-it-all" mentality. A common mistake of many pastors is that of thinking that the allimportant aspect of the ministry is the sermon. He must realize that one of the pastor's most important tasks is to put the church to work.

Ephesians 4:11, 12 bears this out. We are told that God has placed in the Church apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors and teachers "for the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ."

This verse should be read without commas. There is only one thing in focus: "the edifying of the body of Christ." To this end pastors, evangelists, and teachers are to prepare the saints for the work of the ministry — for this is not just a pastor's ministry, but the ministry of the entire body of Christ. As the pastor understands that an important part of the ministry is to help the members fulfill their own divine calling as members of the body of Christ, he will surely have a growing church.

SELF-CENTEREDNESS -

5. A church fails to grow when it is self-centered. A certain tension has always existed between evangelism which is reaching the world for Christ, and the perfecting of the saints in Chrsitian graces. Spiritually-inclined people face a very real temptation to withdraw from the rugged task of winning the world, and retreat into the enjoyment of spiritual gifts and graces for their own sake. Some are so concerned about deepening their own spiritual life and enjoying the exercise of spiritual gifts that they have lost their practical usefulness to the Kingdom of God.

God wants the two poles of evangelism and Christian perfection to be kept in proper tension. We must never lose sight of the fact that the ministry of the Holy Ghost is not only IN us, but also through us, as witnesses to a lost world.

A WEAK SPIRITUAL INCENTIVE-

 Some churches fail to grow because of a weak spiritual incentive. The spiritual dynamics of prayer, intercession, and waiting on God have been lost. The tendency then is to (Continued on Page 7)

Missionary Message

"Madanm Pasteur, I Have A Problem"

Her voice was raised plaintively as I passed her bed and she extended her hand in my direction, beckoning me to come closer. I already knew what she wanted for I could see the white slip of paper held between her slim fingers. Many times we had heard that cry,

"Madanm Pasteur, I have a problem." And when we would go closer to listen this was the usual story, "The doctor gave me this prescription two weeks ago and I am so sick, but I have nomoney, please buy this medicine for me." Our answer was nearly always the same too as we explained that we could not buy for everyone, "We have two or three patients here and we buy all that they need, but thats all we can do." Surprisingly enough they understood this explanation and were mostly satisfied if we prayed with them and explained that we loved them all. Of course that did not buy the medicine.

We have been visiting this T.B. hospital for nine years and often our hearts have been broken over the conditions and the suffering of the men and women there. Some of them cannot stand or sit and are in the last stages of the disease. At times some of them die while we are there. We

have prayed with some and helped them to come to the Saviour only to learn that they went into eternity the next day. Each Christmas and at other times we take the Bible School students there to sing, pray and read the Scriptures with them. There were very few times that someone did not come to the Lord. The students would then rejoice with them and all went home happy that we had been there.

Our God Who knows every longing of our heart heard their cry, saw the little slips of paper and so the impossible took place. Last month while visiting the hospital with two visitors who were here, they too noticed the slips of paper and the crying out. But they could not understand the language so we told them what was said. As we explained to them we noticed that their eyes too were filled with tears. Going from ward to ward, we prayed and ask God to touch them physically and spiritually.

Riding home afterwards one of the visitors asked how it could be arranged to get them all Vitamins (most of the prescriptions were for an iron tonic that they needed). We told them we could purchase this kind of medicine if we knew how many there were and ask permission to give it. And of course we needed the money to buy it. When we arrived home she gave us the money!

We did not waste time, the next time we went to the city we inquired about the price of the medicine, then at the next hospital visit we ask the nurses if we might give to each one and decided with them when we could come with the students to give it out. She said we needed 202 bottles! Before the medicine was bought the Lord supplied enough money for us to buy each one a can of V-8 juice too. The doctors are always asking them to drink juice so this was an added benefit. Praise His Dear Name!

The Saturday morning we had chosen dawned bright and clear and we met in the Chapel to pray and ask His direction before leaving. Then the students piled into the camunet (small pick up truck fixed like a bus) and they lifted their voices in sweet song to give Him glory all the way. People standing along the road looked to see what the noise was.

Nurses and doctors explained to the patients that they must be on their beds to receive the medicine and so those standing or sitting outside in the yard scurried inside to sit primly on their beds. Those who were never able to leave their beds looked and waited. Their hands reached for the things and smiles spread across their faces as they said "Mesi" which is thank you. We told them the Lord had sent it, that He loved them and knew them all by name! Some of them whom we had talked to at length from time to time about their problem. called out and said, "Oh, you did it,

you brought for all of us!" Again we quickly told them it was from the Lord. They hugged the bottles close to them and some hid them under their pillows. substitute the natural for the spiritual, and to carry on the work of God on a natural plane. Some engage in a round of activities throughout the year with one program after another till there is no time left and perhaps no real desire to seek God for revival and advance. We cannot have true church growth if we settle for second best.

TRADITIONS: RELIGIOUS HABITS -

 We may be in bondage to traditions and religious habits.
 Somewhere along the line we may lose our sense of expectancy that God will break in upon us in a fresh way and reveal Himself to us. We begin to follow a routine of spiritual exercises. Our worship and spirituality lose their freshness. Where is the old-fashioned "burden for souls"? Where is the weeping and wrestling with God in fervent prayer? Does the desire for God's work to prosper take priority over our own interests and comfort?

God can break through in any church again. Faith can be revived and the church loosed from its indifference and formality. GOD INTENDS FOR THE CHURCH TO GROW. Let us ask Him to renew our faith so we can approach our task with courage and vision.

I cried, O Lord, give me sight, To see folks both far and near. Help me to work day and night, And prove to all I really care.




