Holiness

In our studies this far we have determined three truths, Namely: that God is infinitely holy; that man, created in the holy image of God, fell through the disobedience of one man, (Adam) and that God has given a positive command, "be ye holy for I am holy".

We have further determined that sin is three fold in nature and requires a three fold cure. This cure is effected in three works of grace; regeneration, sanctification, and glorification.

Regeneration is that work of Divine Grace. whereby mankind is forgiven, born again, justified, or regenerated. To be saved means we are free from or saved from the penalty of death. In forgiveness God blots out all past transgressions, refusing to remember them against us forever. Born again refers to our being adopted into the family of God, becoming the sons of God. Justification is a judicial term, a part of redemption whereby the sinner through the blood of Christ is made just before God the Father. Regeneration is an evangelical term wherein forgiven, man is made new through an impartation of Divine life. All these terms, however refer to one work of grace and all concur at one time when we repent, forsake, and are forgiven of committed acts of sin, the aspect of sin for which we are personally responsible.

One would suppose that a sovereign God could take care of all sin, both committed and inborn, with one work of grace and that through this one work could restore man to perfect holiness.

Unlike committed sin, for which man is responsible, the principle of sin was inborn. Since sin, the principle, was inborn man is not responsible for its being there and therefore needs not be, nor can he be forgiven for it.

(Psalm 51:5). That this principle or law of sin (Romans 8:2) does remain in the heart, after one has confessed his sins and has the witness of the Spirit that he is forgiven, is scripturally sound, and that this nature is not in subjection to the law of God and further hinders the work of God, keeping man from being perfectly holy, is equally scriptural.

In Romans, chapter seven, Paul speaks about several laws. Take your Bible and look at this chapter with me. In verse twenty-two he mentions, "the law of God". Most Bible scholars agree that he refers to the, "table of law", or the ten commandments. In this case this chapter describes an unregenerated man struggling with the law and trying in his own strength to keep it, but is wholly unable to do so. While a man can and mostly does refrain from stealing, adultery, and bearing false witness he will find it most impossible to love God with all his heart, soul, mind and strength and to love his neighbor as himself, even though this is part of the written law. Albert Barnes confirms this, "man cannot in his sinful state, love God at all, for he is not conscious of God, his mind has been blinded by the god of this world." (Notes on Romans).

If, indeed, this is an unregenerated man struggling with the law, he must have been a man who, reading the law, was condemned by the law; this Paul readily admits (verses 7-13). Most sinful people, however, do as they please or wish to do. A few people actually know the law and wish to do better, but thousands of people are carefree, laughing, and happy while they revel in the sin they love. One person told me while in counsel, "But I love what I am doing and really do not want to change." I believe the majority of sinners, even some who profess religion, will admit they love the sins in which they are involved. (Continued on Page 3)

"They came not for Jesus' sake only, but that they might see Lazarus also whom he had raised from the dead." -St. John 12:9

"For weeks the story of Christ's raising of Lazarus from the dead possessed me. It seemed to accomplish just the work we needed. It brought the people. They came to see Lazarus when they would not come to see Jesus. When they saw Lazarus, they believed on Jesus! For weeks we prayed that the Lord would send us a 'Lazarus' - a man so dead and buried in sin that his wickedness had become offensively notorious and hopelessly bad. With unwearying monotony, we prayed the Lord to save the worst sinner in the town - and He did! The man came of his own accord.* * *He was a dreadful character. Everybody knew him; nobody ever expected he would be any better. So far as he could remember, he had never been to a religious service except in gaol [jail]. He was the terror of the neighborhood and did most extraordinary things out of sheer deviltry.* * *We wanted to pray with him, but he said: 'Not this time; one thing at once.' But we prayed hard for him.

"A fortnight later he came to the service and our hearts nearly stood still when we saw the big, rough fellow in his working clothes walk down the aisle and fling himself on his knees at the communion-rail. He was gloriously saved.* * *

'The news of his conversion spread like wildfire. Hundreds of people came

to church to see the man whom Christ had raised from the dead. When it was announced that this man would tell the story of his conversion, they flocked from far and near to hear his testimony. We had been trying for months to fill the church, without success, but when this 'Lazarus' stood up to speak of the things of God, it was impossible to get near the place to hear sermons; they would not come to see Jesus; but they came to see this 'Lazarus' whom Jesus had raised and saved. Hundreds were converted through that one witness. For years he has been a standing proof of God's power. He was an argument that silenced scoffers and critics. Smug hypocrites were offended, but the church was filled and sinners were saved.

This is the power the Church needs. There is no substitute for it. and it never fails. Wherever there is a 'Lazarus' and the continual operation of converting power bringing men out of the death of sin to a life of righteousness and purity before God, the work of the Lord will abound. The Church languishes where there are no conversions. Nothing but the power of the resurrection can save our churches. The substitution of secularization and social activity is a confession of failure.

'Let the churches pray souls out of their graves, if they would do the work of God. Our most urgent need is that we should know the exceeding greatness of His power in the resurrection of the dead.'

Soul Travail The Church's Greatest Need

Gal. 4:19 My Little Children Of Whom I Travail In Birth Again Until Christ Be Formed In You.

Certainly we live in a needy age. On every hand man is crying out for help. This condition has not hit the church and is often being overlooked and bypassed for things of lesser value. We are asked the reason for lack of revival, why souls are not coming in and being born into the church. There undoutedly are many reasons but among the chief problems of the church is the lack of SOUL TRAVAIL by the saints. We need the blessing, and the demonstration of the Holy Spirit but we also need some labor pains of birth. Paul reminds the Galatian church that he travailed in birth for them until Christ was formed within them. In I Cor. 4:15 he went on to relate that we have ten thousand instructors in Christ, yet have we not many FATHERS.. who beget souls through the gospel. The value of souls no longer is counted by many, and the burden for souls is almost a thing of the past-therefore we have very little travail for souls.

Travail must be preceded by two major acts within the person. There must be a time of conception. A time of union and the planting of the seed. Saints must have a time of union with the Holy Spirit when the Holy Ghost plants within them a burden for souls. This will bring true revival. It is not a program, it is not a presentation or entertainment we need but a Holy Spirit conception. Following this must come the development of the seed within the believer. The seed must be nourished, protected and brought to maturity. How long did the saints of old carry the burden for the lost. God laid on their hearts someone and they fed them with love, protected them with a godly jealousy, and brought them to a time of birth.

Travailing is a very serious time. It is a time of agony, sorrow, pain and tears. Jesus showed this travail in the garden when he said, "My soul is exceeding sorrowful, even unto death," (Matt. 26-38) Sweating as if it were drops of blood (Luke 22-44). The term "travail" means to bring forth. In John 15:1 Jesus said every branch

that beareth not fruit is taken away. Yet many of our people have not brought forth in a long time.

Peter tells us in II Peter 1:5-8 the necessary qualifications for bringing forth fruit in the Lord. Far too many of our people lack these qualities; that is why we do not have revival. He started out with Faith, adding virtue (purity) knowledge (understanding) temperance, patience, godliness, brotherly kindness, and charity which is love. Then in verse 8 he said if these things be in you and abound they make you that ye shall neither be barren, nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. If we are barren, and unfruitful then these things must not be abounding in us. The purpose of every saint is to reproduce in the Lord.

The Fruit of the tree has many parts to it. The skin which is likened unto one's profession. We know a fruit by its skin, many people are known by what they profess. Then comes the meat of the fruit which is the possession of the saint. Then comes the juice which is the spirit or the Holy Ghost within the saint. But the fruit is not developed just for its skin or its meat or juice. Buried deep within is the seed which produce more trees of the same kind. We must have seeds within us to bring forth more fruit.

Many Holiness churches are dying because there is no one to take the true saint's place. The travail of the church is gone, we are light, loose and chaffy. We are willing to rest on a far too short and infrequent time of the blessing of God. We are satisfied just to hold our own. But many are dead in our midst, many ready to die, and far too few undefiled as we read in the church of Revelation. How many will stand before Christ empty handed, how many like the fig tree with nothing but leaves? Let us pray for a revival of soul travail within our midst. Without it we are done, without it our best days are behind us, we will decline and fade away. Many of our churches already are in this state and many more on the road to it. God wake us up and spare us before it is too late. Pastor of the

In verse twenty-three, Paul declares, "I see another law," this is not the table of law written on stone but suggests a complete different law. While the written law is an outward set of rules that says, "You may or may not do", this new law is a governing principle within forcing or restraining. Again Barnes confirms this, "this law is an inner principle, leading us or pushing us toward committed sins, an inner passion that has no tendency to pure holiness and cannot be triumphed over but by the Grace of God. (Albert Barnes, Notes on the Romans, P. 195). I come to agreement then-the preceding verses in chapter 7 present the picture of an unregenerated man, enlightened by the law and struggling to keep the law. I also agree that this law is an outward written commandment but in that acknowledgment I am agreeing that the other law is the inner law or principle that causes one to do what he does not wish to do and to leave undone those things he wishes to do, bringing me to the conclusion then that this chapter is in reality the sinner versus the law. But in spiritual type it is the inner struggle of the regenerated heart and the law of sin.

This conclusion projects a problem or a question on the part of many, "Does this then mean that a regenerated person who is not sanctified wholly continually sins?" There is only one answer to that, No! That is, he does not sit down and plan to commit sin and then get the consent of his will to do so. A regenerated heart- a new creature could not possibly be guilty of committing the sins that Paul lists as "the works of the flesh" (Gal. 5:19-21), and retain any degree of spirituality. Those are the acts of unregenerated or backslidden men (Gal. 1:6), vet, not all the people in the Galatian church were turned away, but such as were are guilty of gross in-

The second question involved here then is, what need is there of a second work of grace, if the regenerated heart is not guilty of willful sin? This law of sin that cannot be forgiven must be cleansed. It is emnity against God, is not in subjection to the law of God and hinders the work of God, that is, in one's life. Again it pushes us towards sinning. (Barnes, op. cit.)

If My People Will Pray!

Up the mountains, down the valleys, what is it? The sound of a bell ringing, announcing the good news of a revival here in the mountains of La Croix. "Prepare ye the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God." Oh! the wonderful message of salvation that shall never grow old.

How do we thank the Lord for all that was accomplished by His servant. Rev. Barry Arnold, as the message of salvation and holiness went forth night after night. We saw many of our precious Haitian people bowing at an altar of prayer. Some came to receive help with life's problems, others to receive definite victory over sin. As they came they confessed, one young man admitted stealing from his parents, laughing at God's people, and dancing at all night funeral "wakes". This same young man also said that he had received at one time too much money in change for some sugar cane that he had bought. He had longed to return the money but when he went to find the woman she was not to be found. We instructed him that God understood and he could put the money in the Lord's work.

God's faithfulness to men, no matter what the color, the language, or cultural difference, is marvelous to us. Never again shall La Croix be the same. The night before the meetings closed one of the men in the church rose to his feet and exhorted the people to flee from fornication, which is one of the prevalent sins of the people here. Little did we know that it would be his last exhortation to the church and to his daughter who was there and guilty of that sin. Because four nights later while riding his bicycle he was hit by a truck and went out to meet God.

Six days after the revival another tragedy took place in our area. A young unwed mother who had sought and found God during the meetings, lost her small baby because of an accident. The baby drank poison and died within three hours. We do not unders-

tand the "whys" of God's dealing with us at times, but we thank God we can say along with the mother, 'My sins are still all under the blood". And God's ways are always the best.

Eternity alone shall reveal all that was accomplished in our 1981 revival here in Haiti, we leave it all to Him!

Revival was also held at our city station with Rev. Eugene Winter during the week between the semester break in the Bible School. Again God moved in answer to prayer. We began prayer meetings especially for the revival three weeks before, and then a week before we started praying around the clock as we divided the hours with the church people. Visitation was done with our giving out little leaflets announcing the services. The sun was hot on our heads and the stones hurt beneath our feet but what a joy to ask them to come to hear His blessed Word.

The first evening the evangelist could not be here so our national pastor spoke to an overflowing crowd that spilled out onto the porch. The Word was sweet but the enemy fought and that night none came to pray. But night after night they came and then the Lord spoke in tones of love and conviction and they came to pray. All kinds of people, young men who cried and confessed their sins, older women who had been living in sin without the bonds of marriage, older men who bowed and prayed in tones soft and low till we had to ask them their need. A young student in our school prayed through to victory and is keeping true in spite of severe persecution where she lives. How we rejoiced and thanked Him.

Some who had been cold and indifferent came to ask forgiveness and seek His favor once more. God's compassion met them there and they left in peace. One of the young girls who is our neighbor and had back-slidden came the last night and wept before the Lord. But the pull of the world is preventing her from making a com-

plete surrender, please pray with us for her. Her name is Mari.

Of course all of the messages were translated into the language of the people and this can be comical at times. For instance when Bro. Winter spoke of carnality and said, "No longer will you fly off the handle when you have carnality taken away." Now that term, "fly off the handle" sent our national pastor to confusion. When we saw his distress, we explained in Creole what the term meant, and with a smile he stated the truth. Americans have strange ways of saying things some times. Thank the Lord in heaven we shall all speak the same language.

Our national pastor's choir group came and sang the last evening and also our Bible School students. They sang His praises and filled our hearts with joy. Others came with their instruments and we sang together about His love and grace. Our theme song was "Welcome Holy Spirit". We translated it into Creole and the people learned to love it and to sing it with great longing in their hearts for Him to come truely and fill all our temples with His love. How sweet to trust in Him!

Many of you prayed at home, as we requested, and we wanted you to know that He heard and answered.

But how about you? As I asked Harold, let me ask you: "After graduation — what then?"


Here is what the Bible, God's Word, has to say about the answer to that question:

church, declares that these "Brethren," were carnal, not spiritual even as babes in Christ. I conclude that since they were born again (Babes in Christ) they had not shown sufficient growth in Christ. They got side tracked on some issues, communion, tongues, and some even went back to sinfulness. Paul discusses this, then brings them to the more excellent way of perfect love. This carnal nature had kept them from proper spiritual growth, from loving God with all their heart and from loving their neighbor (brother) as themselves.

I Corinthians chapter thirteen lists some of the things that perfect love will help us do and in a way keep us from. Let us look at these; suffers long and is kind, Behaves well, is not selfish, does not seek her own, is not easily provoked, and thinketh no evil. Does not rejoice in wrong, bears, believes, and endures all things, and does not fail. It is possible then to be hindered from loving God with all our heart, but love Him imperfectly in a regenerated state and if so such a person could be pushed towards these selfish sins, but let us stop here and talk about those next month.

April 17, 1954 is the date inscribed on the cornerstone, but to get to the true beginning of the Lewistown church, one must travel backward in time from that date approximately 15 years.

Jeremiah Cherry became acquainted with the God's Missionary movement via the air waves and a proentitled "Missionary Messengers". Traveling over the highways to the Beavertown God's Missionary church, he sat under the ministry of Rev. George I. Straub. The Holy Spirit was faithful, a hungry heart was willing, and thus a new name was written in glory. Subsequently, a dream was born as the desire grew in the heart of Brother Cherry to have a holiness church in his hometown.

For sometime a Home Missionary effort was carried on at Pine Glen, a few miles southwest of Lewistown under the direction of Rev. Straub and Rev. Truman Wise. However, financial difficulties made it impossible to finance a pastor and the work was discontinued.

After the close of the Pine Glen work, the faithful few would travel to the Beavertown church from time to time to have their spiritual batteries recharged, but the dream of having a church back home remained.

At various times Brother Cherry would approach Rev. Straub with the request to have a church in Lewistown. Definitely believing in trying the spirits, Brother Straub made no apparent move for some time. Still, the dream lived on, strengthened by desire. Cottage prayer meetings were held in the homes of those interested in having a

church. A treasurer was appointed and offerings were lifted at these services and put in reserve as further strengthening of the dream.

Finally, after the passage of several years, Rev. Straub received permission from the Lord to move ahead in the Lewistown area. Traveling to the local area he approached the owners of a farm at the west end of town. Although the property was not for sale, by the time Rev. Straub had finished presenting his reasons and request, the reply was as follows: "If you will buy one lot, we will give you another one." Knowing Brother Straub as most of us do, you can imagine his reactions as God gave definite proof of his approval in this new undertaking.

With a goal in view, definite plans could now be made and put into motion. Tentmeetings were held on the present site and God poured his blessings out upon these services. Don't misunderstand, satan did not move out of town when the holiness people moved in. Instead, he gathered his reinforcements and opposition was forthcoming. From sewage problems on through many phases of the work, he stuck his barbs in wherever he could, but God was victorious over all.

Equipment was moved to the site and now the work began in earnest. Physically unable to participate in the actual building project, nevertheless, Brother Cherry was on the scene to lend encouragement and to watch the development of his long time dream. As the large earth moving machine took the first bite out of the ground, God came down and gave Brother Cherry an uncontrollable blessing as he sat in his car watching the action. The dash of his car took the brunt of the overflow blessing as God had his way.


Foot by foot and block by block the work progressed as God's people rallied to the cause. Labor was donated from many churches in the conference. There is no doubt there was much sacrifice went into the building of the Lewistown church; sacrifices which only eternity will reveal. The following related incident will give some idea of how God moved the work along:

Although he had no one to help him, Brother Straub felt led of the Lord to come to Lewistown one day to work at digging a ditch. Telling the Lord that he needed someone to help him, he proceeded on his way. Before he had been on the scene very long, he heard someone say, "Do you need some help Reverend?" Looking up, he saw a neighbor man who told him he just felt like he ought to come over and help the preacher. Brother Straub then told him that God had sent him to help him. Although this kind of language was somewhat strange to the neighbor man, it was another proof of God supplying the need.

Now the big day had arrived - April 17, 1954 - the doors of the new church were opened for Sunday School and church services. The dream had become realization. An afternoon service was held in which the Central Pennsylvania Gospel Band provided the special music and Rev. George Straub preached the dedicatory message.

In that first morning service ten persons were received into member-(Continued on Page 10)

(Continued from Page 8) ship. Three of the charter members, Mr. Jeremiah Cherry, Mr. Ephraim

Lepley, and Mrs. Violet Hoy are still with the congregation while some others have moved on to their heavenly address.

Rev. Straub supplied the pulpit for some time as the church was getting organized and on its feet.

For approximately three years, Rev. Ray Stehrs pastored the church as he and his family traveled back and forth from their home in Centre Coun-

After the resignation of Rev. Stehrs, Rev. Paul Miller filled the pulpit for one month, making this the shortest pastorate in his years of pastoring. The brevity of his stay was due to a mix up in stationing procedures.

In 1958, Rev. John White and his wife moved to Lewistown to pastor the church. The Whites were with the church five years during which time two sons came to bless their home. During this time, one of the men of the church acquired a bus which he used to transport people to the various services. In a recent visit to the church, Rev. White related how God supplied their need and souls were brought to Christ as they pastored the Lewistown Church.

In 1963 Rev. Marlin Crock and his family moved from Lebanon to Lewistown. At this time the church acquired an unused church property in downtown Lewistown to be used as a parsonage. The Crocks moved into this property upon their arrival to pastor the Lewistown church. For

quite sometime they lived with the tune of banging hammers and all the other noise and inconvenience that goes with a renovation program. Finally, from all the chaos there emerged a comfortable and homelike parsonage. The Crocks were with the church eight years during which time the exterior of the church was bricked, the parking lot black topped, the basement finished, and classrooms were built as the Sunday School continued to grow. The blessings of God were manifested as the work moved forward.

July 1971 was moving time for Rev. Truman Wise and his wife as they took over the pastorate of the church. In 1972, hurricane Agnes with the resultant flood waters moved through the area and the parsonage was inundated. This left the Wise's with much material loss and stress, but through it all, God was there with grace sufficient. For a time they lived in a house trailer on the edge of the church parking lot. Then, the former parsonage property was sold, a basement erected, and a double trailer moved on to the second church lot adjacent to the church parking lot. This location made it much more convenient for the pastor. During the tenure of Rev. Wise, the interior of the church was repainted, the basement walls were painted, and a new church piano purchased.

September 30, 1974 Rev. John Zechman and his family moved into the Lewistown parsonage. Some of the major projects of the past six and one half years have been the replacement of the church roof, added insulation in the church attic, and carpet in the sanctuary. The money for the

carpet project was entirely donated for that specific need with none being taken from the treasury. At the present time, the bathrooms are in the process of being remodeled, sponsored mainly by the "Young Married Class" of the church. The Sunday School of the church averages nearly 70 in attendance with the majority of these attending the Sunday evening and prayer meeting services. God is still moving and prayers are being answered. The day of miracles is not past; God is still on the throne. In a recent Sunday morning service, God came upon the service before the dismissal of Sunday School resulting in a victorious altar service. The following prayer meeting, shouts of victory and praise were heard as people minded God. One sister related how she had minded God in a monetary matter. This not only was a financial help to the church, but most of all, a spiritual lift to all God's childen as joy was restored to her heart.

Space and memory would fail to relate everything, but these are a few highlights of the past. The future with its accomplishments rests with God as His children walk in the light and obey the Spirit.

So, from a dream over 40 years ago to the present reality, we can say with the song writer, "How great is our God!"



From the desk of Rev. Kenneth E. Walter -- President

Psalm 90:12, "So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom." History teaches us that this verse is part of a prayer of Moses. It suggests the idea that we may run out of time before we have fulfilled our purpose or our goals in life. There seems to be a natural tendency in most of us to put off until tomorrow what really should be done today. Few of us ever seem to learn the value of getting something done ahead of time because we have not really counted the cost or the penalties we have suffered for being late. The payment is often small and insignificant in itself but if we add them up over a period of time they often amount to a great loss.

Easy credit is usually advertised as being for your benefit but in reality the motive of the seller is to promote his own advancement. He knows that you may not be in his store when you have the money and you might spend it for something else so by enticing you to buy now and pay later he has a sure sale and will end up with more profit through adding interest or carrying charges.

Most of our young people are spoiled with the comforts and luxuries of life by handing it to them and are readily conditioned to live on credit by the psychology of the merchant who "wants to help young people get a start in life." He loads them up with everything they want and before it is paid for they need something else. Thus they live a vicious cycle of credit consoling one another in the fact that "we won't ever have anything if we don't buy it on credit." What they never take into serious consideration is how much more they would have if they had sacrificed a little in the beginning, saved some money and drawn interest, and multiplied the purchase power by paying cash, taking advantage of cash discounts, and real bargain cash sales. In a short time they would have far more for less without the threat of losing what they have if they happen to lose their job or can't keep up the payments.

Perhaps you are thinking what does all this have to do with the text. May I submit for your thinking that most of the thoughts and actions of our natural life carry over into our spiritual life and it is rather evident that many church people are trying to serve God on "credit". "I will pay my vows someday." "I plan to go into full-time service someday." "I intend to do more for God someday." Good intentions are fine but our days are numbered and we have an obligation to God which must be met.

Our text also suggests the idea that we should make the best use of our time through the exercise of wisdom. Wisdom is not necessarily education. Many people have knowledge without wisdom, but few people have wisdom without knowledge. Wisdom would tell you that we can accomplish a whole lot more, easier and better, if we are properly prepared for the task at hand. I fear that Satan has often taken advantage of a zealous young person who refuses to get bogged down in the ruts of procrastination by influencing him to overreact to his call, and thrust him in the work of the Lord without proper preparation.

Not one of us would think of submitting to a surgeon's knife in the hand of a novice though he were seriously concerned about your physical condition and possessed great desire to be a surgeon. Life is too precious to take such chances. God's word teaches us that one soul is worth more than the world and that it would be better for a man to have a millstone tied to his neck and be drown in the depths of the sea rather than offend one of God's little ones. Time and again those who profess over the most spiritual would urge a young person to undertake such a serious responsibility without adequate preparation.

I would be the first to admit that education without the annointing of the Holy Spirit is also inadequate to get the job done, but I refuse to accept the idea that you can't have both. I firmly believe that an educated person with the annointing of God upon

him is the most effective human instrument. God has to accomplish his purpose in times like these.

As another school year draws to a close several of our Institute students will graduate and go forth into the whitened harvest fields. We covet your prayers in their behalf. Some of our high school graduates feel a call into Christian service and plan to continue on to higher education. They need your prayers as well.

Some of you have talent and ability God would like to harness and devote for His purpose. May I urge you to bring yourself under subjection and make the necessary adjustments in your life to enroll in Bible School this Fall. Your days and months are running out.

The fields are white for harvest and the laborers are few because many of you are bogged down with the cares of life.
