

Editorial

Stewards of God's Secrets

I Corinthians 4:1, 2 "Let a man so account of us, as of the ministers of Christ, and stewards of the mysteries of God. Moreover it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful."

Paul here writes of the unique qualities of the ministry. There is a two-fold description found in verse 1. The New American Standard translation throws further light on these verses—"Let a man regard us in this manner, as servants of Christ, and stewards of the mysteries of God. In this case, moreover, it is required of stewards that one be found trustworthy."

In both descriptions the minister is seen in a subordinate position in relationship to his master. The word used here as "ministers" was used to describe oarsmen. The literal translation of the Greek word is "underrowers." These are submissive to the master of the ship, but are indispensable to enable the ship to reach its destination. As a servant he does not make decisions about the direction of the ship at any point in time, but, he labors together with the captain to bring the ship safely to port.

The second description finds the minister in subjection to his master but in a place of special privilege and responsibility. The word steward (oikonomos) describes one who was a manager or overseer of the estate of a wealthy man. He would know much about his master's affairs and enjoy a trusted position, with the possessions of the master at his disposal. He also was the supervisor of the master's under-servants.

Paul's description of the minister finds him in a place of unique freedom. While the servant-steward is responsible to those around him, his primary responsibility is to his master, the One who called him and who placed him in the ministry. Paul is free to do God's will—let others complain — he rises or falls with his Master's judgment.

Further the minister is seen as the overseer of a rich possession — "the mysteries of God." The Greek word for mystery (musterion) comes from a derivative of mos, which means to shut the mouth. Therefore, the word carries the idea of something about which God has remained silent, a truth that has been more or less hidden, a secret known only to those who search diligently. Paul speaks of this

mystery in Chapter 2, verse 7 "But we speak the wisdom of God in a mystery, even the hidden wisdom, which God ordained before the world unto our glory."

What is this mystery? Is it wisdom that is unattainable? Listen again to Paul as he writes to the Ephesians — "Having made known unto us the mystery of his will, according to his good pleasure which he hath prepared in himself:

That in the dispensation of the fullness of times he might gather together in one all things in Christ, both which are in heaven, and which are on earth, even in him."

A secret, a keeper of secrets—
yes—it is the open secret of God's
plan to redeem man from sin; a plan
ordained before the foundation of the
world. It has been revealed to these
stewards; indeed, they have been entrusted with it. Here the purpose of
the steward is not to perpetuate
secrecy '...' to make sure that men
everywhere know of God's secrets. He
must take that which is hidden and
declare it to the world, and to supervise the further declaration of these
secrets through the lips of underservants in the church.

Then we notice the primary requirement of a steward—that he be found faithful. This was the mark of a steward. It was not customary that masters closely supervise the steward's work. Therefore, it was of prime importance that he be faithful. While the steward was a supervisor he never forgot that he too was a slave, directly responsible for the daily operation of the estate.

It is interesting that the quality most desired is faithfulness. It is not good looks or pleasing personality. It is not charm or wit, nor brilliant thinking, it is faithfulness. One has written, "It is be faithful in perfect trustfulness, faithful in unswerving obedience, faithful in unselfish devotion, faithful in unsullied truth."

Fret not because thy place is small Thy service need not be For thou canst make it all there is Of joy and ministry

God help us all to be faithful stewards of His secrets. - D.L.F.

The New Birth: ITS EVIDENCES AND RESULTS

I John 5:1-21

According to history, the Epistles of John were written about A.D. 90 and were produced for a fourfold purpose as John declares;

1. That man might be happy - I John 1-4: "And these things write we unto you, that your joy may be full."

2. That man might be holy - I John 2:1, "My little children, these things write I unto you that ye sin not." Quit practicing sin. He makes it clear there is nothing like a sinning saint or a holy devil.

3. That man might be safe - I John 2:26: "These things have I written unto you concerning them that seduce you or try to deceive you." I John 4:1; "Beloved believe not every spirit. But try the spirits whether they are of God, because many false prophets are gone out into the world."

4. That we might be sure - I John 5:13; "These things have I written unto you that believe on the name of the Son of God; that ye may know that ye

have eternal life."

The two key words of these Epistles are know and fellowship. With John, true religion was more than something to be worn on Sunday and then put off and laid aside for the rest of the week. With him it was both a life, an experience, also something to be lived and enjoyed daily.

Note how different the Apostle John begins his Epistles from that of the other Apostles. He begins without salutation or introduction. It is not self or personality he is trying to introduce to a lost world, but rather a living resurrected Christ who was and is the answer to the ills and problems of the day.

At no time do we read where John took out time to prove Christ's existence or argue with man relative to His coming.

He began his Gospel by saying, "In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God."

Immediately following this declaration, he began to chronicle His great acts. "All things were made by Him, and without Him was not anything made that was made. In Him was life, and the life was the light of men. And the light shineth in darkness, and the

darkness comprehended it not." St. John 1:1-3.

John was not a preacherette and had more than a sermonette to preach to his people. He was well named when called the son of thunder. He preached with force and further declared his messages were not second hand, but rather that of which he was an eye witness.

I John 1:3; "That which was from the beginning, which we have heard. which we have seen with our eyes, which we looked upon, and our hands have handled, of the Word of Life, For the life was manifested and we have seen it and bear witness and shew unto you that eternal life, which was with the Father and was manifested unto us; that which we have seen and heard declare we unto you, that ye also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with His Son, Jesus Christ."

The way into Christian fellowship is through Christ and His shed blood. While there are many who make sport and light of the cross, the death and sufferings of Christ, this does not change or lessen the fact; "Without the shedding of blood there is no remission of sins." Hebrews 9:22.

He further states, "If we walk in the light as He is in the light, we have (present tense) fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ, His Son, cleanseth us from all sin."

In this chapter is the battle ground. Verse 8; "If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us." This verse is in perfect harmony with the Psalmist David's testimony; Psalm 51:5; "Behold I was shapen in iniquity, and in sin did my mother conceive." David is saying this, he was the product of a warped and sinful nature. This nature was transmitted into the human heart at the fall and passed onto every son of Adam.

Romans 3:23; "For all have sinned and come short of the glory of God." That doesn't leave man with very much to feel proud over or boast

A bird's-eye view of how we appear before God in this condition is set forth in Isaiah 1:5-6: "The whole head is sick and the whole heart is faint. From the sole of the foot even unto the head there is no soundness in it but wounds and bruises and putrifying sores. They have not been closed, neither bound up, neither mollified with ointment." The inner life of man without God appears unto the Lord like one with running cancerous sores. There certainly isn't anything pretty about this. It is this ugly nature and condition of the heart the Holy Ghost seeks and strives to expose so that man might be able to see himself in the light fo God's Word and holiness.

While this is the condition of many, we need not live and die in this condition. As John further stated, I John 3:8; "For this purpose was the Son of God manifested that He might destroy the works of the devil." Before this can be done we must be willing to acknowledge and confess our sins before Him.

A promise accompanies confessions. I John 1:9; "If we confess our sins. He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. To many this may sound like a hard thing. However, with God all things are possible.

In making up broadcasts, I have a bulk tape eraser. I lay an entire spool of tape on the eraser and then snap the switch and in moments the entire tape is completely erased. I have marvelled at that time and again and thought of what has been accomplished in the scientific world. While I don't understand how it is done, any more than how a recorder puts sound into a tape whereby voices can be kept from year to year.

According to the Bible, faith in Christ has the same effect in the life of the sinner. It gives way to forgiveness and cleansing.

I John 5:4, "For whatsoever is born of God overcometh the world." He infers the new birth brings one into a new relationship with the world. This is in harmony with Paul's Epistle to the church at Corinth. II Corinthians 5:17; "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature. Old things are passed away, behold all things are become new."

Our weapon in overcoming the world is faith. "This is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith." (Continued on Page 10)

Missionary Message

All Things To All Men

There is a door that knows no rest From early morn till sun goes down It's felt the touch of countless hands And heard the cries of all around.

Sometimes the touch of fingers small Tap lightly on till someone comes At other times the hands are large Insistent, hurried and like drums!

This door has seen a crippled child This door has seen a mother mild. Its seen a boy arrayed in blood And watched as tears came in a flood.

Its heard a plea for "just some bread", Or medicine that they cannot buy, And many come with desparate needs That caused the hearer's heart to sigh.

This door has wondered why the steps,

That lead to it are always filled, It didn't know a missionary Was there as God had willed.

The words above are just a wee evidence of how a missionary is called upon to be all things to all men. The list of activities and requests that they are called upon to fill. Let us explain:

We are called upon to be marriage counselors Even though we have never been married we are called upon to settle disputes between married couples. It means sitting patiently for hours listening to each side, all the while praying to the Lord that He will give you wisdom. Then we pray with the couple giving them His Word and have watched with thanksgiving when we have watched from the window as the couple left the yard holding hands!

We are called upon to be pharmacies - All manner of prescriptions are carried to our doors with the plea to help buy the medicine or to give them what we may have in our possession. Ointments, aspirin, cold pills, chloroquine (fever pills), laxatives, worm medicine, all things they need but have no money to buy, so to the missionary's house they go.

We are a general store Little ones

and older ones, asking for a thimble, a bit of glue, paper to cover their books, money to buy their books, boxes to line their mud walls, stockings to make a ball, kleenex, fly spray, alcohol, and on and on. Isn't it true that the missionary has all things, so they demand often to have these all things shared with them, who have so little.

We are a lending bureau Anything from wheelbarrows, shovels, saws, ladders, oilcloth to cover their heads when it is raining, pens, pencils, flower vases, your car as a taxi, books, and baskets! Sometimes these things are damaged or destroyed in their hands and they cannot replace them. But they feel the missionary can always find others!

We are banks - Somehow word has reached all comers that the missionaries are rich. So they come with their needs. The stories they give are often tragic. Tears course down their faces as they tell of sick, or dying ones, of their destitute situations. How are we to know if they are telling the truth? Here is an example. A young woman came to the door while we were scrubbing the floor one Sat. afternoon. Her story was that her sister has just had a baby in the city hospital and that the Dr. would not allow her to leave without things for the babies, they had no money or clothes...and they wanted help. She seemed so sincere. But to test her, I told her, "Okay, wait till I am finished with the work and I will go with you to the hospital and we shall see the babies, and I will help you." Surely, I thought if she is not telling the truth she will not want me to go. But she agreed. So I rounded up some baby clothes when work was finished and some money to help and went with her in her car, traveling some eight miles to the hospital. At the hospital she went in to see if I could be allowed to see the babies and when she came out she told me that the sister had left to go to Jacmel and that we could find her at the station where the trucks left. So we went to the station. She left me and went to look for the sister. The driver told her, so she said to me.

that the sister had already gone. By this time I knew that she had lied. There was no sister or babies...so I ask her to leave the car and I came on home with my money and my clothes. But I had trusted her. I was tired and discouraged.

Often we give because we do not know for sure. Food, money, medicine, money for birth certificates, for weddings, for school, for books, for transportation, clothes for naked bodies. All the needs stare the missionary in the face till they cry in despair to the One Who knows all their needs and understands.

We are teachers, nurses, and preachers. In the churches, in the schools, in the market place, in the villages, in the businesses where we go to buy, in homes and on buses, we speak of our precious Saviour. This is our joy! This is our calling! This is why we came! But all of the things I have written above are duties that fall to us too.

Why are we telling you all these things?

- Because it means that for us there is hardly any task that we begin that does not suffer many interruptions before it can be accomplished. That means frustrations!
- Because there is hardly a meal that is eaten that is not eaten in installments. Our food cools while we answer needs at the door. This can be frustrating!
- 3. Because after you listen to dozens and dozens of heartbreaking stories day after day and you weep with them, we soon feel that soon we shall never stop crying. Our eyes are tired from weeping and it saps our strength and courage!
- 4. Because we realize that there are literally thousands of others in this country for whom there is no one to go to, no one to fulfill their needs, no one to cry with them. They are hungry and sick and they have no Comforter!

We are willing to be all things to all

While in conversation recently with a church leader, the comment was made: "Calling's out! So far as most pastors are concerned, calling's almost a thing of the past. More and more pastors are making fewer and fewer calls."

The man of God fell silent. His face wore a grave, concerned and troubled look.

I gasped in shocked astonishment. Calling, a thing of the past! It couldn't be. It couldn't! Especially not after it had proven for many years to be one of the most effective means and measures ever of getting men and women and boys and girls to Sunday School and Church where they heard (many of them for the first time!) the good news of salvation from sin and Holiness of heart.

A lump caught in my throat and a weight fastened itself heavily upon my heart. What, I asked myself, had brought about this dreadful change? Why no calling anymore? Had the ministry lost a vital part of its meaning...that of being "a servant?" How dared the minister (and his family) do less than He who "made Himself of no reputation, and took upon Him the form of a servant...?" Philippians 4:7.

Quickly my mind went to a woman who, through consistent calling and patient love and concern, was finally soundly converted and sanctified wholly and is now ready for Heaven. "If it hadn't been for you folks," she repeatedly has said, "I'd perhaps be in hell today. I didn't want to come to church but you kept calling, and you were so patient with me. O, I'm so thankful you didn't give up on me!" Did calling pay? A thousand times, yes!

Then there was the woman dying with cancer; a dairystore man's wife. We heard about her condition through some friends. We called on her week after week after week, praying with her and for her. One day His Light broke through on her soul. She was gloriously and genuinely converted. How proudly she introduced us to her many influential friends and acquaintances and always, she ended her introductions with praise to God for saving her soul and thanks to Him for sending us to her home. Shouting on her death-bed, she was escorted over Jordan's chilly waters by Jesus Himself. Was it worth our effort? Our time? Yes! Yes! Yes!

There are so many more about whom I could write, but time and space will not permit. However, I shall give just one more incident. He was a red-haired, freckle-faced, shy,

timid and bashful lad. His feet were calloused and tanned brown. He seldom wore shoes when we saw him in the home. Through patient calling and caring and loving, the lad finally came to Sunday School; then church. Soon he was gloriously converted and then sanctified wholly. One day he approached Brother King with the good news that God had laid His hand upon him to preach the good news of salva tion from sin and heart Holiness. It was a time of rejoicing for all. As we watched this young man grow and mature in the things of God, and fulfill his call, we bowed our unworthy heads and praised Him Who had granted us the privilege of calling upon the family and inviting them to know the Saviour whom we loved so

Needless to say, we still believe in and practice "calling" in our pastorate! Him!

When I speak of calling I don't have reference to the visiting of the church members every week or two or three. No. No. This weekly visiting on a select few leads to fraternizing, to socializing, and a loss of respect for the minister and his message. We are admonished in Proverbs 25:17 to. "Withdraw thy foot from thy neighbor's house; lest he be weary of thee, and so hate thee." By all means visit your church members and friends and do not neglect the sick and the infirm, the aged and the feeble. This is your obligation as pastor of the church. But the kind of calling to which I refer is that of making short visits in the homes of the sinner, the backslider, the unchurched, and praying with them and telling them that you are concerned over their soul's condition. We need to get back to door to door evangelism.



TOWN TO TO TO TOWN TO

In The Presence Of The King

To appear before an earthly monarch, all of us would have to learn how to conduct ourselves in his palace. That would be true not only of us in the new world but even of those who have been reared in the lands where royalty still reigns. Without instruction, we would be ignorant as to what we should do and most likely unappreciative of the opportunity of standing in the presence of a king.

Years ago I was requested, perhaps I should better say commanded, to report to His Majesty, Haile Selassie, Emperor of Ethiopia, on my observations regarding the schools in his empire. I was glad to be told precisely when and where I should come, what I should wear, how I should bow at the doorway of the royal reception room, just how many steps I should take before I should again bow indicating my desire to obey His Majesty's command, where I should be seated, and then what next to do.

Of course I said nothing until the king had ceased speaking, usually by asking a question. In the solemnity of the occasion it was not difficult to be silent, out of profound respect for the person and the position of the sovereign and out of regard for his excellence and importance. I was silent in respectful submission and reverent deference to the Emperor. My silence was the mark of my esteem for his worthiness, his moral character and personal qualities. It was proper for me to be still in his presence, for this was his house and his hospitality which in gracious condescension he had opened to me.

I shared that experience with the students at Wheaton College at the first chapel service of the following school year. It was then not necessary to remind them that the chapel is the house of the King of kings, who is worthy of far more respect, esteem and honor than we would render to any earthly king.

It is at the invitation of the King of Glory that we enter His house to meet with Him and not with others, to hear from Him, to make reply to the questions with which He searches our hearts. We are to enter into His house in silence of tongue and submission of spirit to worship Him. He alone is worthy of our worship. Even now we should begin to learn the reality of the worship we shall experience when with the redeemed of the earth we sing in His presence, "Worthy is the Lamb that was slain to receive . . . glory, and blessing."

We enter the King's house with profound reverence for

Him, our Lord and Saviour. We hold Him in honor mingled with love and gratitude. We are to sit in silent wonder of that worthy One as we remember our unworthiness apart from His mercy and salvation. We enter with awe and adoration. Worship is true of the whole assembly together, but adoration is the response of the individual heart to the Saviour whom, having not yet seen, we love.

We enter His house with humility of spirit, with that gentleness, teachableness, tenderness, lowliness and meekness which constitute proper conduct in His presence. We enter His house with hunger of heart for the living God, for He alone can safisfy the deepest longings of the human spirit. Beyond the sacred page of Scripture and the song we seek Him. We enter with the hush of the Holy Spirit so as to be still and to know that He is God. We enter the unhurried attitude of heart that instinctively says. "I will hear what God the Lord will speak: for he will speak peace unto his people."

Our reverence as we enter God's house, our silence before Him, our lowliness of heart, our worship and adoration, our earnest expectation that here we are to meet the Holy One can be a help and blessing to others as well as to ourselves. Who knows the need of the stranger who comes for the first time to worship with us or the hidden heartache that well-known friends and fellow members of the congregation may bring with them? Our light chatter on trivial matters can distract or dismay another in his need so that his heart is not ready to meet the Lord in the service. Our thoughtless irreverence can be a stumbling block to that one who needs strength and steadiness. Again, our attitude can be the very example he requires to have him know what God can be his unfailing helper.

We are commanded by the King of kings to come to His house, for we are not to forsake "the assembling of ourselves together, . . . and so much and more, as (we) see the day approaching." In entering the open door of His house we are to shut the heart's door to all other persons present and to set aside the problems that perplex us, the heartache of yesterday and the haunting apprehensions about tomorrow. Sitting quietly before the service begins in the church, we can prepare our hearts to meet the King by silent prayer, by searching His Word, by reading anew the glorious expressions of praise in the hymnbook. Then the heart is ready to meet the King in His house.
