JESUS TAUGHT...

Obedience Is the Test of True Love

"He that hath my commandments, and keepeth them, he it is that loveth me; and he that loveth Me shall be loved of my Father, and I will love him, and will manifest myself to him." John 14:21.

The most solid proof one can give of his attachment to and affection for Christ is by keeping His commandments. One's salvation does not consist in merely knowing the commandments, but rather he that "keepeth them, he it is that loveth Me." Here we see it is an utter impossibility for one to retain his sonship while violating the divine statutes and laws of God.

A MAN WHO DID NOT LOVE GOD

Some years ago, while in conversation with a man in the South. I spoke to him about his soul, and asked him if he loved God. Immediately he began to speak of the goodness of God, and stated that they had churches in the community that believed in old-fashioned revivals. I informed him that I was a minister and was deeply interested in the salvation of the lost, and tried to get him to see the danger and folly of going on in life void of the presence of God's love abiding in his heart. He further stated, "That's true; however, I am honest in telling you that I do not love God." This came as a surprise to me after knowing of all the good things God had done for him. He said again, "For me to say I love God and not keep His commandments would set me up as an untruthful man."

(1) True love strives to know what His commandments are, and what the Lord requires. "And now, Israel, what doth the Lord thy God require of thee, but to fear the Lord thy God, to walk in all his ways, and to love him and to serve the Lord thy God with all thy heart and with all thy soul." Deut, 10:12.

(2) True love curbs any and all things that rob or chill our affections for the things of God. "Yea doubtless, and I count all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord: for Whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and do count them but dung, that I may win Christ." Phil. 3:8. The Apostle Paul plainly states he brushed aside an honorable position, popularity, reputation, wealth, and loved ones, so that he might be able to please God.

(3) True love always desires to have its object of adoration near. It was this which caused the poet to pen the words...

"Blest be the tie that binds, Our hearts in Christian love. The fellowship of kindred minds, Is like to that above. "When we asunder part, It gives us inward pain, But we shall still be joined in heart, And hope to meet again."

(4) True love to God and the keeping of His commandments brings the highest type of fellowship. "He shall be loved of my Father, and I will love him, and will manifest myself to him." Verse 23 states, "And we will come unto him, and make our abode with him." Obedience to God will cause Him to take up a spiritual residence in the heart. "I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with me." Rev. 3:20.

(5) True love is the queen of all graces. It binds and keeps together. When obedience and love to God are foremest in a church, there will be no strife and dissension. One will not need to worry about church fusses and splits. No church loses the respect of the community until the church loses respect for itself. It is a sad day for a congregation when its own membership begin to absent themselves from its services. When this takes place, obedience slackens, and it becomes very easy for us to excuse ourselves from the services and duty. It is very sad when professors of religion can be counted on to be there at the social function, or at the place of business, but cannot be counted on when the interests of the Kingdom are at stake, and when the Son of God goes forth to war.

(6) True love is self-sacrificing. It rather seeks to help others than to set up ambitions which center on self.

Jesus proved His obedience and love to the Father by doing His will, and carrying out the work as given by God. His love was not only in words, but in deed, as well. This we see manifested on Calvary where He proved His love to a lost world.

During the course of their conversation, Mr. Gandhi asked him if it were a fact that the American people had signs by the wayside, "Jesus Saves," while across the street they advertised a brand of whiskey. He said he bowed his bean before the mahatma and said, "It all could be." The Indian zealot was astonished as he was under the impression America was a Christian nation. Thus we see that decaying love buds into disobedience, indifference, and leads to a state of apostasy. It was this that caused the prophet Jeremiah to cry out, "Oh, that my head were waters and my eyes a fountain of tears, that I might weep day and night for the slain of the daughter of my people."

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Another Gospel!

Galations 1:6 — "I marvel that ye are so soon removed from him that called you into the grace of Christ unto another gospel."

As one makes his way across the conservative holiness movement today he occasionally hears some strange sounding gospel preaching. We are in real danger in places of substituting another gospel for the "good news" that Jesus Christ can save and keep from sin. Perhaps I should say we are adding to rather than merely substituting for the gospel.

Jesus, on one occasion, looked the Scribes and Pharisees in the face and denounced their practice of adding to the requirements of God. "And he said unto them, Full well ye reject the commandment of God, that ye may keep your own tradition." Mark 7:9

The zealot of Jesus' day was absorbed with many ceremonies and rituals, and indeed was critical because the disciples failed to adhere to such minute details as washing their hands before eating. The modern day zealot also becomes supercritical when individuals fail to buy their particular brand of dry goods and notions, such as buying the proper width and color of necktie, or even wearing one; using the proper kind of material for his suit or having a buckle on his shoe.

Sometimes camp meetings become forums for evangelists to try to outdo one another in preaching this "other gospel." The more extreme and bizarre one becomes, the more certain he is of having a following.

Paul, the great apostle, called attempts to add to the gospel of Jesus Christ perversions, and indicated that deviating from the preaching of the clear, plain "good news" be worthy of a curse. The problem in Galatia was the same as in Galilee—people adding to the gospel of God. Those recent converts from Judaism were being intimiated by Judaizers who called for adherence to certain Jewish ceremonies and rituals. Paul called that attempt "another gospel" and then placed the emphasis where it should be. Listen to Galatians 2:16 "Knowing that a man is not justified by the works of the law, but by the faith of Jesus Christ, even we have believed in Jesus Christ that we might be justified by the faith of Christ, and not by the works of the law, for by the works of the law shall no flesh be justified."

I do not seek any accommodation with this world, but I do call for a balanced Scriptural approach to the preaching of the gospel. I do not shrink from the particular preaching which names things, but I decry various attempts to add our own brand of gospel with its questionable exegesis and hermeneutics.

Perhaps you have heard of the would be cellist who kept sawing away on one string. Somebody said, "That is not the way to play a cello. You must run your fingers up and down the strings to find different notes," "Oh, no," he replied, "those fellows are looking for the right note, but I've found it."

It takes no time in effective Bible study to saw away on one string; it takes no practice in prayer to play one string; it extracts no demands for careful exegesis to plunk on one string. In fact it may be a sign of mental and spiritual laziness to do nothing but play on your pet string. Beautiful harmony comes from the blending of single tones into chords.

Brethren, who not just preach the gospel?

It could be just my imagination or we could be facing a problem in the area of the pastor and his church. I frequently witness a loss of respect for pastors by their congregations. It becomes increasingly more difficult to supply pastors and easier for the congregation to criticize the preacher.

When pondering this condition to arrive at a possible solution I became interested in learning if there has been a break down in the clearness of the duties of the pastor in relation to his church and his pulpit conduct, thus creating this loss of proper respect.

The following list of do's and don'ts is the result of this research. Pastors read them carefully and let us compare our present ministry with those of other ministers of "yester-year". Perhaps it will help to solve the problem at hand.

Let his ear ever he opened to the cry of the afflicted and dying.

Be genuinely interested in people and their problems, but never "nosey;" the minister is not a news commentator.

Never be involved to the extent of being a busy body.


Do not share problems with other members of even his own family; if it is confidential, keep it that way.

M. Stay in his study as much as possible, given to prayer, fasting, and studying.

N. Enjoy some recreations but be discreet and temperate.

O. Cultivate a good life with his family, be cheerful, relaxed, loving but firm in conviction. Never bring pastoral problems to the family or discuss troubles at meal time. "A merry heart doeth good like a medicine."

I. General Decorum

- A. Beware of discouraging the people.
- Avoid the error of contantly finding fault with his congregation -either in or out of the pulpit.
- C. Be continent of his tongue.
- D. Act with great caution.
- E. Never prefer one above another.
- F. Let his life be consistent, (in perfect harmony) and never be partial.
- G. Have nothing about him that speaks of effeminancy.
- H. Do not conform to the world in dress and pomp.

- Q. Avoid sitting up late at night or late mornings; this tends to laziness.
- R. Maintain high notions concerning literary merit and academic distinctives; ignorance has no premiums or excuses.
- II. In your study.

- Strive to use sound judgment and good sense in study and preaching.

- A. Preach the law and its ter-
- B. Never take a text you do not fully understand.
- C. Never make a text say what it really does not say.
- D. Beware of purely emotional preaching, reach the heart and mind of your hearers.
- E. Never contradict the Holy Spirit stay within the boundaries of the Book to avoid this.
- F. Do not lift the text out of its proper setting, this creates heresies.
- G. Never acclaim anything to be truth unless it comes directly from God.
- H. Preach to all the people but never at any person.
- Be diversified have more than a few messages.
- J. Avoid paraphrasing whole books lest it becomes tedious.
- K. Avoid any quaint or fantastic attitudes.
- L. Never mimic, ape or imitate another preacher.
- M. Never assume an air of importance; remember you are nothing outside of Christ.
- N. Always make a fine appearance and always speak in a clear and refined voice.
- O. Preach to be understood.
- Guard against fine or flowering preaching.
- Never harp on one thing and avoid being excessively negative or overly positive.
- R. Go from the study and your knees directly to the service.
- S. Preach the Word and not yourselves, always glorify God and not you.


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Humanism (Amalek) in the Church and Christian School

- W. When called upon to administer any corrective measures always act in a spirit of love, concern and compassion, but never with an attitude of arrogance.



Jacky's Adventures

THE "MON" OF GOD

Almost a year after the meeting in Aldersgate Street when Jacky's heart was strangely warmed by the love of God, a new thing happened. George Whitefield, who had started preaching out in the fields under the sky, asked Jacky to take his outdoor services near Bristol so he could move on to other places.

"You know what people say about Whitefield," Jacky said to Charles. "When he preaches, his voice can be heard a mile, and when he sings he can be heard for two miles."

"I know," agreed Charles, "but your voice carries too, and if you go where the hills form a sort of amphitheater, you also can make big crowds hear you."

"I'll try it," Jacky decided, "God being my helper! I never thought I'd preach outside the church, but . . . Jesus preached on a mountain. It must be all right."

So it was, that on a Monday afternoon in May, Jacky stood on a little knoll outside the city of Bristol and began his "field preaching." Whitefield had started with a congregation of 200 and ended with 20,000. Now these same folk came just as eagerly to hear Jacky. After preaching near Bristol for about a year, Jacky moved on to London, In the fields near London, there was often a little woman standing at the edge of the crowd near Jacky when he preached. It was his own dear mother. Her prayers and radiant face helped Jacky to preach his best. Of course Jacky was a grown man now, and had been, even before he went to America as a missionary to the Indians. While most people called him "Mr. Wesley," his mother still called him "Jacky." So did his brothers and sisters.

One day, very early in the morning when the miners were trudging to their work deep down in the dark earth, Jacky and a companion went up a narrow street to the poorest section of Newcastle. They stood at the end of the street and started singing the One Hundredth Psalm. Three or four persons stopped to see what was the mat-

ter. Soon, four or five hundred more crowded around. They wondered what would happen now.

Jacky stepped up on a higher piece of ground so that he could see the people better and they could see him. He took off his hat the first thing.

"Friends," he said so all could hear, "everyone can do as he pleases, but when I speak of the things of God or when someone else does, I like to uncover my head in reverence."

In a moment everyone else took off his hat, and the service began. Before Jacky had finished his sermon, twelve to fifteen hundred people were listening eagerly to every word.

"If you would like to know who I am," Jacky said, "my name is John Wesley. At five o'clock this evening I plan to preach here again with God's help."

At five that evening, the hill where he was to preach was covered from top to bottom with people. When he was through speaking, men were so anxious to get near him that they nearly trampled him under their feet. Why? "Out of pure love and a wish to show our kindness," one explained.

John Nelson, one of the men who had listened to Jacky told a friend how it all seemed to him. "As soon as John Wesley started to preach," he related, "he turned his face to where I stood. He looked right at me and I became so afraid that it made my heart beat like the pendulum of a clock. I said to myself, 'This man can tell me the secrets of my heart, even all my wicked thoughts and deeds.' But I knew too that as he talked he was showing me a cure for my sins-even the blood of Jesus. I was so ashamed of my past life that I couldn't even look up. I imagined all the people were staring at me.

"Then before Mr. Wesley finished his sermon, he cried out, 'Let the wicked man forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts, and let him return unto the Lord, and He will have mercy upon him: and to our God, for He will abundantly pardon.'

"I said to myself, 'If that is true, I

will turn to God today.' And I did."

This is the way Jacky did his work, and this is the way he spread the good news of salvation. Many of the miners, fishermen, weavers, spinners, foundrymen—in fact, hundreds of the working people of all England—were converted through Jacky's preaching.

In some other places, people were not so friendly to Jacky as they were in Newcastle. Those who hated his preaching tried to break up his meetings by throwing stones and rotten vegetables on him and on those who listened to him. They hired drummers to beat their drums loudly and drown out Jacky's voice. They located the nouses of Jacky's followers and some times destroyed them.

"You can tell who belongs to the Wesley crowd by the houses that have the windows knocked out," one man remarked.

Many times Jacky had to face a mob. And face them he did! Never did he turn his back. One evening just as he had finished preaching out of doors, a rough gang seized Jacky and dragged him through the streets of the town.

"Wait!" shouted Jacky, "if you'll let me speak, I'll explain what I have been doing."

"No! No! No!" they cried on every side. "Knock his brains out! Down with him! Kill him!"

A big ruffian tried his best to do just that. Several times he struck at Jacky with a large oaken club.

"If he had hit me once on the back of the head," Jacky told Charles later, "that would have been the end. It would have saved him any further trouble. But every time he missed."

Another brutal man forced his way through the mob and raised his arm to strike Jacky. Then, all of a sudden, he let his arm drop and gently stroked Jacky's head.

"What silky hair he has" the man said unexpectedly.

Of course it was the Lord that caused him to change his mind, and it was the Lord that kept the mob from harming Jacky.

Most amazing of all, the captain of the mob, a prize-fighter, came up and stood in front of Jacky.

"Sir," he said meekly, "I will spend my life for you. Follow me and not one soul here shall touch a hair of your head."

The Purpose of Home Missions

Isa. 54:2 Enlarge The Place Of Thy Tent. Lengthen Thy Cords. In this issue of the "STANDARD", we are beginning a series of articles concerning Home Missions. Today we wish to discuss with you the PURPOSE OF HOME MISSIONS. We wish to divide this article into five simple parts to deal with this truth.

First: THE PURPOSE OF HOME MISSIONS is to fulfill the teachings of Jesus. In the gospels we read that he sent his own disciples out two by two to the Lost Sheep of the house of Israel. This was a "Home Missionary mission." Again in His teachings we find we are instructed to "GO INTO THE HIGHWAYS AND HEDGES AND COMPEL THEM TO COME IN. THAT MY HOUSE MIGHT BE FULL." We can not Occupy, which means taking possession of, if we let our home front slip into the hands of the world. We are only as strong on the foreign missionary front as we are on the Home.

or

FAITHFUL?

Lionel Whiston recently wrote: "The Christian is not called to be successful, but to be faithful. He is set free from the fear of failure or the compulsion to succeed. God can use his mistakes and turn his apparent failures into the means of advancing His kingdom, even as He turned Calvary into Easter."

Words such as these must never be taken to excuse needless failure. Pious platitudes about good intentions will never forward the Church nor save the world.

Yet there is a very important truth here. In an imperfect world shot through with evil, faithfulness and "success" are not necessarily related one to one. We have but to think of a multitude of Bible examples to see that this is so.

I had occasion a few days ago to work through the eleventh chapter of Hebrews again. The heart of the chapter is a thrilling summary of the faithful lives and service of men and women of Old Testament times. What brought me to pause, as it always has, was the abrupt and unexplained transition of the middle of verse 35. From the faithfulness that succeeds we are suddenly turned to the faithfulness that suffers.

By faith Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, Samuel, David, and the prophets "subdued kingdoms, wrought righteousness, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched the violence of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, out of weakness were made strong, waxed valiant in fight, turned to flight the armies of the aliens. Women received their dead raised to life again."

This is a tremendous panorama of the victories of the faithful. There is no man living who would not want to be part of a company like that. The biggest sinner in town would gladly embrace any life-program that would assure him of instant success and prosperity.

But it doesn't always work that way, and we know why. The man who was "good" in order to be prosperous and happy wouldn't really be good at all. He would still be as selfish and self-centered as he always was.

Then abruptly, right in the middle of a verse, the scene changes. Right next to the greatest miracle of all, dead raised to life, are the words, "And others..."

"And others were tortured, not accepting deliverance; that they might obtain a better resurrection: and others had trial of cruel mockings and scourgings, yea, moreover of bonds and imprisonment: they were stoned, they were sawn asunder, were tempted, were slain with the sword: they wandered about in sheepskins and goatskins; being destitute, afflicted, tormented; (of whom the world was not worthy:) they wandered in deserts, and in mountains, and in dens and caves of the earth" (vs. 35-38).

In the same crowd with the same faith we find not only victory, but adversity. Yet who is to say that one group was more faithful or more godly than the other?

There will always be a measure of mystery in facts such as these. That the way of the transgressor should be hard is only what one would expect. That the way of the righteous should be difficult is not so easy to understand.

Perhaps all we can say is that, if the Christian faith is really to meet all our human need, it must provide a way to meet suffering without bitterness and to endure failure without frustration.

We can never be at our best until we are "set free from the fear of failure" and "the compulsion to succeed." Nothing paralyzes effort more than fear of making mistakes. Fear of failure is the foe of good works.


But when we see that God can use our mistakes and turn even our failures into means of advancing His kingdom, we are set free to follow the guidance of His Spirit.

God still turns Calvarys into Easters. The defeat and suffering of the Cross becomes the victory of the crown. Even death itself becomes the gateway to life.

What the natural man calls success may be withheld from the child of God. What he attempts may seem to fail. Yet the truth remains that faithfulness is itself the highest kind of success.

The promise is not, "Be thou successful, serene, without failure unto death." It is, "Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life" (Revelation 2:10).

News From Our Alumni!

Another Sunday on the mission field is coming to a close. It's nighttime now. A drumbeat has been going off and on throughout the evening. Probably someone is sick or dying. They are calling upon the idols for healing.

I write this from a small island (2 x 4 miles) off of the S.E. coast of Taiwan, China. The people here are fishermen. We came here over a year ago to preach the Gospel of Christ.

At 6:30 A.M. the children start coming for Sunday School and gather outside of our four room, Chinese style, \$10.00 a month house. Sunday School starts at 8:00 A.M. Sometimes they sing. They used to fight. At 7:45 A.M. I go out with a megaphone to call others to come and worship. Over fifty, sometimes sixty pack into our 15 x 12 room. Others stand outside. The songs of praise ring with a small thunder that is meat to the ears of any Christian worker. Stories, Bible verse, coloring, prayer. A number of these children have prayed for salvation and have been changed. Some from neighboring villages walk to attend.

About 1:30 P.M. we begin preparing for a trek that takes us to three different villages and four locations, for outside Sunday School. We leave the house at 2:30 P.M. We walk. Before entering a village, I pray to bind the forces of Satan. Then also pray for the Holy Spirit to freely move and work. Children see us approaching. They run, jump, sing, clap, and shout. Mothers and fathers, and grandparents come to see and listen too. Songs, stories, pass out scripture cards bless the children (some stand so still as I lay my hand on their heads and say, "Siong Dei Jok Hok Li; God Bless You"), and then move on to another place. We sit down to drink some water between villages and see many goats feeding. We pass a huge Buddhist temple.

After they fished all night and caught nothing, Jesus told the disciples to cast the net on the right side of the ship; and they caught a netfull. For some years I prayed, "Lord, where is the right side of the ship? I want to catch fish." One day in prayer He showed me that the right side of the ship is in going out and holding outside meetings. The disciples caught 153 fish. We have never fallen below this amount at these outside meetings and often have over 200. About 5:30 P.M. we arrive home.

We have ten preaching points in five villages. This past Christmas Day was a special day. At one of these points I got stoned. Oh, the joy that filled my soul as with uplifted hands shouted loud and long Hallelujahs. Afterwards prayed for and blessed the people. No blood. (Hebrews 12:3-4). Two weeks before, a group tried to come into our house at night. The next day two brothers came for the purpose of "hearing the gospel". A few days later one expressed a hope of salvation. From fire to water, that's how they temper steel.

Healings. The major ones come to mind. The mentally ill lady, the old man about to die, the boy with skin disease.

A fellow just came for some cold medicine. This fellow's father, three years ago was bitter by a poisonous snake. The man died.

I greatly desire that the people here will come to know God. The book of Ezekiel promises thirty-three times, "They shall know that I am the Lord." This is my prayer.

The Tempter came by the other day and laid out his wares. He asked, "What do you want the most?" I looked at his bright stuff, dazzing it was. With wry little smile, feeling no tug toward his hollow things, looked skyward and said, "I want most to live in heaven forever." He left.
