A crucified and buried Christ could not effect such miracles. This is the work of our living, resurrected Leader and Lord.



Life From The Dead!



There was never an enterprise which seemed more completely at an end than did that of Jesus on the last Old Testament Sabbath. Christianity died with Christ, and was laid with Him in the sepulchre. When He was buried, there was not a single human being that belived He would ever rise again.

The breakdown of the disciples had been complete. When He was arrested, "they forsook Him and fled." What remained for them but to return to their homes and their fishing nets as disappointed men?

Jesus had, indeed, foretold His sufferings, death and resurrection. But they had never understood these sayings; they forgot them or gave them an allegorical turn which, after His death, yielded them no comfort whatever. The women came to the sepulchre on the first day of the week, not to see it empty, but to embalm His body for its long sleep. Mary ran to tell the disciples, not that He was risen, but that the body had been taken away and laid she knew not where. When the disciples were met together "they mourned and wept." There never were men more utterly disappointed and dispirited.

How is it to be accounted for that in a few days these very men were full of confidence and joy, their faith in Jesus had revived, and Christianity had a far greater vitality than ever before? The disciples say the reason was that Jesus had risen, and that they had seen Him. They tell us about their visits to the empty tomb, and how He appeared to Mary Magdalene, to the other women, to Peter, to the two on the way to Emmaus, to ten of them at once, to eleven of them at once, to James, to the five hundred, and so forth.

Are these stories credible? They might not be, if they stood alone. But their reports of the resurrection of Christ were accompanied by the indisputable resurrection of Christianity. And how is the latter to be accounted for except by the former?

The remarkable thing is that when the disciples resumed their faith in Christ they were no longer pursuing worldly ends, but intensely spiritual ones; they were no longer expecting thrones, but persecution and death—yet they set about their new work with an ardor of devotion and a faith in results which they had never shown before.

What effected this change? The disciples say it was the resurrection and the sight of the risen Christ. But their testimony is not the only proof that He rose. The incontestable proof is the change itself — the fact that they had suddenly become courageous, hopeful, believing, wise, and equipped with resources sufficient for the task before them.

It is a happy thing that the resurrection is capable of such a proof; for if Christ be not risen, our faith is vain; but if He be risen, then the whole of His miraculous life becomes credible, for this was the greatest of all miracles. He was "declared to be the Son of God with power, according to the Spirit of holiness, by the resurrection from the dead" (Romans 1:4).

The Easter season, when once again we commemorate the fact that Jesus Christ rose from the dead, is a fitting time in which to place your trust in Him who said, "I am the resurrection and the life; he who believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live; and whoever lives and believes in me shall never die" (John 11:25, 26).

- Be consistent with God's Word and your testimony no matter where you may be.

Be cheerful under all condi-

tions; God's grace is sustaining under all circumstances. Never appear to be going through a severe trial, that you have been unusually burdened or that you have

A very serious layman told me some time ago that God had called him for the express purpose of keeping preachers in their places. While few would be so bold as to make such declarations, yet, many have assumed the attitude that they too are called for such a vocation. The honest preacher is called of God. It is a very high and holy calling and I would seriously question such a statement for I doubt that God would entrust such a serious vocation to any but Himself.

Let us look at some do's and don'ts

- Never carry a haughty attitude but strive to be men and women of deep piety.
- Let the Christian women be in subjection to her own husband and let her adorning be that of a meek and quiet
- Let the husband rule his own house well but never be a tyrant.
- Let each so live that his children and neighbors have confidence in his experience.
- Avoid sitting up late; so that

- you may rise early to seek God's direction for the day.
- m. Let the member's household be one of peace, serenity and happiness.
- n. Instill Christian and not worldly values in the hearts of the children by precept and life.
- Make your dinner hour a happy hour, never criticize, condemn or scold during this
- Spend time as a family and D. equal time with each child, avoid favorites.
- Remove all vicious thorns and thistles of carnal affections and impure desires.

II. The worship service.

- Be ready to do anything for the support of the public worship service.
- Develop a relish for God's word and the worship ser-
- Keep your minds deeply concerned with worship and God's word.
- Spend much time in fervent prayer before entering the service.
- When in God's house remember it is His house; refrain from foolish jesting and lightness; be silent and in an attitude of prayer and worship.
- Receive the word in prayer f. and faith.
- Do not suppose that you have no need of continual instruction.
- Do not suppose that you have h. heard it all
- Do not choose favorites, supposing that other ministers cannot instruct you, listen as though it were your last sermon, it well could be.
- Do not be absent when you could possibly be present.
- Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy.
- Invite your neighbors and friends to accompany you to church.

III. You and your pastor.

- Love him genuinely, regard him for his worksake.
- Never make him a buddy; he could well be a worthy companion on a hunting trip, etc.
- Strive not to be his greatest friend but may he always be

Missionary Message

They Come Here Every Year

As we passed by a group of women at the hospital a few Sundays before Christmas, we heard the one lady remark to the other in the bed beside her. "They come every year". You could tell by the way she said it that she looked forward to our coming and I was glad we were not going to disappoint them. It was not that other groups do not go to minister to them but the Bible School group of young people was special. Why? Because some of the ones there suffering with T.B. were young too and as they listened to our young people tell how God had healed some of them and led them out of sin, it gave them courage to hold on for the same miracle in their lives.

We got a late start that Saturday morning which is not unusual in this



country, for they often arise with the sun and when it is late coming up they are late too on leaving their beds. So we waited till they came and then we sang, prayed and ask God to help us as we would go. Dividing them into two groups they scurried into the camunet and off we went, singing all the way. God blessed us to have a Christian driver who wished to go with us in the hospital and he sang and prayed along with us.

The hospital is divided into two groups of buildings, the first being a place for general diseases, where there is often little hope of recovery. Many older ones are there and many that break our hearts as we look upon their condition. Some of them have been brought there by relatives who will never return to visit and if we know that is the case we like to spend

a little longer time with them. The other area is down the road a ways and it is only for T.B. people, some of them in the worst stages and others



who they have told they will not have to stay long. The total this time as we went was about 400 patients as they had had to let some go for there was not enough food for all. Often we will glance at what we see them receive at mealtime and mostly it is some soupy mixture with a few pieces of cassava or potatoe in it. Because of this when we can we slip some money to the nurse who is in charge of the kitchen so they might have some vegetables and other small things for the week. God has supplied the money through His people and we are grateful.

Many of the people who are there look forsaken and will speak to us in a sing-song voice of despair, asking for anything they think we might give



them. Others have shining faces and whose hearts are filled with His love as you will see from one of the pictures with this article. This older lady sings with all her might and thanks us for coming. One of the young women there cannot talk so she just grunts and smiles motioning with her hands, and when we give her things from time to time she thanks us with a smile that makes us want to cry.

Others are so ill that they have their head covered with a sheet and they are so thin and small it looks like nothing is under the sheet till you lift it and look into the sunken eyes of the victim. Often as we touch their forehead it is hot with fever and they are too weak to respond when we talk to them of Jesus and pray at their bedside.

The students prayed and sang, giving their testimony one by one and reading the Christmas story as we went from room to room. Often the sick ones sing along with us and will




request one of their favorites. In their joy they will clap their hands at times and say a loud "Amen" when we are finished.

Each of the sick ones received a gospel portion and a package of cookies. Often they will eat the cookies immediately or maybe hide them under their pillow saying to us that we have not given to them yet, but we keep track and have to reason with them that they are under the pillow where we saw them carefully place them.

Beside some of the beds you will see what looks like a pile of unopened flower buds. And that is what they are. They go outside, those who are able and choose the buds that are ready to open bringing them in for the night and then putting them into



Don Gessner is currently the president of the newly reorganized Alumni Association of Penn View Bible Institute. He recently came to the editorial office of the Standard for the following interview.

"Don, tell me a little about yourself.

I know you graduated from Penn
View Christian Academy. When was
that?"

"1972."

"You have been in evangelistic work how long?"

"We are in our sixth year."

"Your work takes you all across the country doesn't it."

"Mostly east of the Mississippi at this time."

"You really keep busy don't you?"

"Yes, we have. This has been our best year ever for which we thank the Lord."

"What are some of your goals in the reorganized Alumni Association?"

"Let me first of all make an opening statement in reference to our reorganization. I believe there are two major areas of the Alumni Association - the inward and outward -the inward being that of the organization itself and the strength that it can build within itself, causing it to have the credibility that it needs to properly effect its outward appeal. One of the mistakes that the Alumni Association made in its first attempt to organize was failing to see the importance of building a good foundation as an organization. We immediately tried to move to the outward and did not have a base to work from. Our main goal in the newly reorganized Alumni Association is to build on a new concept. Perhaps I could share with you what I'm referring to in a three point outline.

First, you have the organization of the Association which involves the

leadership, the officers and the chapters that are organized. As part of the organizational structure you also have plans and programs, which involve the membership dues, special projects, support, alumni publication and then our goals. Not only do you have leadership, and plans and programs of the organization but you have Homecoming which helps to develop pride and loyalty. Homecoming is a time for promotion of events such as banquet programs. We have already established a banquet program for the purpose of orienting our alumni which is always held the 1st Saturday of Penns Creek Camp. At this time we have anticipated annual awards - Alumnus of the Year, etc. Not only do you have organization of the Association but you must build strength in the organization. Long range planning, projects of various degrees, and the introduction of present students to the Association are all a part in helping to build the strength necessary for the success of the organization. One example involving strength building within our own association is the scholarship program and free membership to the graduates for the year immediately following graduation. The third point of the outline is that of the fruit of the Alumni Association. One of the fruits is that of public relations. I firmly believe an Alumni Association can be one of the most effective means of public relations and one of the strongest supporters through both direct and indirect methods such as financial and influencial support of the school."

"Sounds to me like you are to a degree restructuring the Alumni Association. How do you define membership? Who is eligible for membership in the Association?"

"Under our proposed Constitution, Article number three, Section one and two reads 'Membership in the Alumni Association is open to all persons who have completed at least one academic year in the High School or Institute department.' And then, 'Membership is open to all current and former members of the faculty and staff.'"

"Are you finding a great deal of interest or is it hard to produce interest among Alumni – to come back and get involved in the school?" "In our situation, I suppose, we would have an disadvantage because this is our second attempt in organizing. But, I believe there are some incentives that can be built in to the Alumni Association to help build that foundation necessary for participation of alumni. Estimating an eligibility of approximately 800 people, we presently have active membership enrollment of 11%. We anticipate steady growth because of incentives that have been built into the organizational structure."

"Are you finding it difficult to find where our Alumni are located?"

"That's been a very difficult matter, but we now have a committee who is researching and compiling a directory of all those eligible for membership."

"I heard you mention something about the newsletter. This would be something new for the organization. Could you tell us something about the frequency of publication or what's going to be involved?"

"Yes, our very first newsletter called Alumni Alive is now in the hands of the printer for publication. We've decided to go with it on a bi-annual basis during its infancy."

"Do you intend to send this out on a subscription basis?"

"No, this is a free publication made available only to actively enrolled memebers."

"What is the current membership fee?"

"Two dollars a year."

"I'm really excited about what you said regarding a scholarship. Do you anticipate that this is going to be an annual award—tentatively at least?"

"Tentatively, yes, we are going to make it an annual award."

"Is it for people to come back to the Institute for classes or for people who are in the Academy and having financial struggles?"

"It will be given to those who are graduating from the High School as an incentive to return to the Institute."

"Do you see an increasing role for the Alumni Association in the future of the school?"

"Yes, I certainly do. That role, from the point of view may be similar to that which we know in government today as a lobby group. I believe in-

(Continued from Page 8) fluence as a lobby group may be a very vital key as to the direction of Penn View's future success. Our effectiveness will only be felt as we maintain the creditability necessary for influence.

"What kind of feeling toward the school do you basically get from Alumni?"

"I don't particularly like to separate Christians from non-Christians for one of the very purposes of an alumni association is to be the means of reuniting former students, regardless of the spiritual state. However, for the sake of communication, the non-Christians may have a tendency to portray a negative attitude about the school while the Christian would be a bit more sympathetic. I understand the origin of both these attitudes and would consider them to be normal reactions."

"I can recall in the past, activities like picnics where Alumni were invited back on campus to get involved in wholesome fellowship and fun. Do you have anything like that planned in the future?"

"Yes, we do. On May 21st we plan to have a spring sports event involving a softball game between Alumni and the Institute department. Then on the 17th of September, we have considered a bike-a-thon which would aid in raising funds for our association along with another sports event that same day similar to that of the Spring sports event."

"How do you see your contact or association with the newly formed public relations department? Do you anticipate any closer ties there?"

"We have already formed a working relationship with the P.R. department and anticipate further development in the days ahead. The alumni
brochure is being distributed in school
services where alumni are present
and individuals from the school are
available to answer any questions
that they might have. There can and
should be a reciprocation from us to
the public relations department as
well."

"What could you say to encourage participation in the Alumni Association."

"Perhaps I could mention just a few things to develop further credibility toward the organization as to things which have already been accomplished. I. One of the earliest things we did was develop a brochure introducing the Alumni Association to everyone. 2. We have Homecoming every year the 1st Saturday of Penns Creek Camp. 3. We have our own letterhead and membership cards. 4. A video machine has been donated to the school to aid in the work of Public Relations. 5. Pledge cards are used as a means for which people can donate money to the Alumni Association which in turn is given to the school as a gift from our organization. 6. I mentioned earlier, our first newsletter is now at the printer. 7. We have just finished drawing up our proposed Constitution and by-laws and 8. an Alumni Scholarship program has been established. Most of the short range goals that we originally set out to accomplish are now completed. I might mention as far as long range goals. which may appear very long range to some, it is our hope of someday having an Alumni Administrative Building placed on campus fully underwritten by our Association."

"That would certainly help to fulfill one of our big needs here. Would you really say that the Alumni Association is alive and well and its future is bright?"

"Let me respond by just simply saying an emphatic YES!"

"It surely has been a privilege of mine to have you in my office to share in this interview and we appreciate the work you're doing. Of course I recall when you were a student here and now you're representing us everywhere you go. It's almost inevitable that someone is going to ask, Where did you go to school?' We point to your work in the Kingdom with pride and I mean that in the right sense of course. We feel like you are representing us well and the work you are doing as Alumni Association President is just another of those contributions that you are now making to your Alma Mater."

"As a final comment, Penn View has certainly had a definite influence on my own personal life as well as that of my wife and only Eternity will reveal the results that it has produced."

"Praise God for that! Thanks again, Don."

- Seek not all his time and friendship to the exclusion of others.
- Visit the parsonage on occasions, do not over stay and never discuss other members.
- Compliment the minister, but avoid flattery.
- g. Be careful when complimenting other ministers in the presence of the pastor, avoid expressions like," that was a great truth - we don't hear it like that".
- Pray especially hard if you have a feeling or dislike for him or his family.
- Pray daily and earnestly for him, remembering he is human.
- Be ready to help in any need if possible.
- Give an occasional gift birthday etc. It could be an offering of food. Love must be expressed as well as spoken.
- Invite the minister and family home to dinner once in a
 while. There is a special bond
 of friendship and love, when
 we share our meals.
- m. Remember his children are human; they will not tend to be the worst ones if the congregation does not force

- them in that direction.
- Never criticize anyone, much less the pastor in the presence of his family.
- Do not invite the class leader nor the visiting minister and then have pastor for dinner.
- If you invite the evangelist, invite the pastor and family also.
- q. Do not choose favorite preachers and let the pastor know he is not one of them.
- Cooperate as much as possible in all areas; however, never compromise a Godgiven principle.
- Give ear to his admonitions, love him for the truth and pray for him consistently.
- Never rebuke an elder this is Scriptural, however you may with caution point out weaknesses.



Progress Report Cafetorium Building

We are pleased to report steady progress toward the completion of the interior of the Cafetorium. The balance of the ceramic tile has been set and additional fixtures have been installed in the restrooms. The required emergency lighting system is now in place in the basement level and we have received our final certificate of occupancy.

Now that spring is upon us we would like to concentrate on completing the exterior work on this building. It is imperative that the brick work be completed before the elements of another winter cause any further deterioration.

In the February issue we appealed to the "Standard" family to help us with this project. We sincerely appreciate those who have so graciously responded up to this time. To date we have 1,350 brick sponsored. This is an excellent start towards our goal of the 27,000 brick needed to complete the building exterior. The cost has been calculated at \$.20 per brick including the mortar.
