Then Came The Morning!

In his old age, Alfred Lord Tennyson is said to have been walking in his garden early one morning. Suddenly he came upon a humble servant woman. "Good morning," said the venerable poet. "And what is the good news today?" "The only good news I know, sir," replied the woman, "is that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners." Aye," replied Tennyson, "that is good news indeed!"

What marvelous news we have to bear to a sin-benighted world. Jesus Christ came, was crucified, conquered death, and is coming back again. That is good news indeed. In that news is everything that sinner needs to hear - that there is hope of deliverance from the stultifying bondage of sin. In that news is everything that a believer needs to hear - that there is freedom from that terrible carnal nature with which we were all born.

Matthew makes a very distinctive statement in his narrative of the Resurrection. He writes, "In the end of the sabbath, as it began to dawn toward the first day of the week, came Mary Magdalene, and the other Mary to see the sepulchre." Matt. 28:1.

Oh, what a dawning that was! The two women named Mary came early in the morning to find a day dawning that would shatter the oppression of sin. They came from a night of bitterness and frustration to a dawn of purpose and fulfillment.

The Apostle Paul, writing years later, tied the veracity and purpose of our entire system of belief to that Resurrection Dawn. Listen as he says, "If Christ be not risen, then is our preaching vain, and your faith is vain...ye are yet in your sins.

Resurrection power was the constantly repeated theme of the early church. There was power in such a message that could not be denied, and which sustained the Christians as they faced a firestorm of vicious persecution. They fully recognized that without the Empty Tomb the Cross was stripped of meaning; it was a tragedy beyond words.

"As it began to dawn" On that morning of all mornings it was more than the appearance of the physical sun appearing to chase the shadows of night away, but the Son of Righteousness arose with healing in His wings, with the Keys of death, hell, and the grave. and shouted until the chains of hell shook, 'I AM ALIVE FOREVER-MORE

Then came the morning! With that

morning the Night of Sin's Dominion was Broken. Yes, it had been a long sin-strewed road from the Garden of Eden and Adam's fall. Though sin still stains the human race, yet because of that Resurrection Dawn we need no longer remain under sin's domination. We can be freed from the penalty, the pollution, the power of sin in our lives, and we live with the promise that one day we shall be free from the very presence of sin.

Then came the morning! With that morning the Night of Satan's Reign is past. Oh, our great adversary, Satan, still is going about the land, seeking whom he may devour. He is still seeking to deceive the saints as he comes as an angel of light. But he knows that his doom is sealed and fate is fixed. The arch-fiends of hell thought they had won a great victory when Jesus went into the tomb, but praise the Lord, the Seed of the woman has bruised the serpent's head, and one day the task will be completed.

Then comes the morning! That Resurrection Dawn is the portent of another dawning, another great morning! Just as surely as He came according to prophecy, was crucified, according to prophecy, was buried, according to prophecy, rose again triumphantly, according to prophecy. SO HE WILL RETURN AGAIN! Another day is dawning - another morning will dawn in the New Jerusalem as we gather around the throne of God to rejoice forever with our Risen Lord!

The poet caught a glimpse of the significance of that morning when she

I saw not the hill nor the Cross where they nailed Him.

Nor heard His last words through His quivering breath:

I bore Him not hence to the tomb that received Him

So silent and cold in that chamber of death:

But stronger than sight is the faith that believes it.

And greater than reason, God's witness to me:

For sin and uncleanness the Christ made atonement;

I know that He died, for His blood cleanseth me.

I saw not the angel that came at the dawning

Faces About the Cross

"And sitting down they watched him there." - Matt. 27:36.

Jerusalem — the city of some of earth's most golden history, and of some of its darkest crime — was astir again. It was Passover time. Jesus and His followers had visited the city and were hailed with great joy by the multitudes. Between that hour of grand triumph, with its temple-cleansing act and calmer days following, Judas had sold his Lord, Pilate had tried to save Him from crucifixion and failed, and now He walked, a lonely figure, toward Calvary.

"See, He cannot carry that heavy cross!" shouted a Roman soldier. He had just fallen beneath the cross He bore. Gritting his teeth, the Roman centurion stepped up. He knew the framing and deceit of the trial and his sense of justice and fair play made him despise Jesus' enemics. "We are left with the dirty work of their petty foolishness," he muttered.

"Make a Jew carry the cross," bellowed a soldier. "You have authority to press into obedience anyone whom you will," the soldier reminded him. The centurion nodded assent to the latter statement, He knew that, His brow wrinkled. "No," he snapped, "I would not so honor a detestable Jew!"

Glancing over the multitude he spied Simon of black Cyrene. "Look here, fellow," he shouted, pointing his finger directly at Simon. Simon knew the Roman law; he could not resist the order, for the centurion had power to force him into such service when he needed a man. Walking calmly out to where Jesus stood, sad and wan, Simon looked at the centurion, "What do you wish of me?" he asked.

"I want to honor you with the privilege of carrying this innocent man's cross to the crucifixion area. He is an innocent and good Teacher, but the Jews have ordered Him put to death for some insane reason. He cannot carry Him own cross — He is too weak."

Smiling up at Jesus as he stooped to pick up the heavy cross, Simon took it and walked slowly before the Saviour and they wound around the road to Calvary. Jesus said nothing, for He knew that history would accord Simon a place of immortal fame—He needed not to speak now.

At the place of the crucifixion, Simon unshouldered the cross, dropping it on the ground. A hole had been dug wherein it was to stand. Soldiers wordlessly removed Jesus' robe and left Him standing bare as was the custom of all criminals for crucifixion. At the executioner's command Jesus laid Himself down on the cross. A rough soldier stretched His arm out and flattened the back of His hand against the crossbar. Another pulled a huge iron spike from his spikepouch and started driving it through His hand. His hand quivered, but Jesus did not flinch nor attempt to draw it away. He said softly, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." "What was that He said?" one looked at the other as he asked. As they fixed the other hand. He repeated the same words, and again, as they crossed the feet and spiked them to the lower beam of the cross, He whispered, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." (The original Greek words here translated once, indicate that He said these words over and over again.)

Raising the cross to its upright position, there remained now nothing more to do but to "watch Him" until He expired. This was part of the dreaded work of the centurion. For if those crucified were not watched, friends would naturally take them down and deliver them. So, the long dreaded watch began. Sitting down suggests hopelessness, inability to do anything, apathy, resignation, and possibly despair.

The soldiers watched Him, casting lots for His garments, which was perfectly in order in that day. This was part of their privilege—to take the garments of the crucified, if they were worth anything. Casting lots was the most equal and just way they knew to do it. His "seamless robe" was too valuable to divide; therefore, they chose this way to discover who should have it. Even in His death His life benefited others. The world has never ceased to draw earthly benefits from the redemptive work of Christ. It is filled with charitable institutions and places of mercy and help, resulting from the Savior's touch of life.

The centurion watched Him. Grave, sober and possibly seething with the sense of injustice done in this crucifixion, the older man of Roman power sat stubbornly by. He wanted to see just what the end would be. When it came, he murmured his conviction, which has become like a thundering trumpet down through the Christian ages, "Surely, this was the Son of God!"

The priests and leaders watched Him, seething in their wrath and now, rejoicing that their plans were at last carried out unfolled. Now, they could rest in peace; this Jesus would create no more problems for them, so they must have throught and whispered there that day. They knew not then that they were only seeing the beginning of their problems with Him and His followers. They and their political descendants will never see the last of their problems; trying to rid the world of Christianity until Christ returns to earth to dethrone all such powers and banish them forever from the earth.

The lowly disciples watched Him, distraught and bewildered now. Their minds had refused to remember His promise to rise again in three days, or misunderstood it to have some other meaning than a physical resurrection. Their hopes were slowly draining out of the hourglass of time with fleeting moments. It is not too much to suppose that many of them expected Him to perform a miracle and actually come down from the cross, yet even now. Why could He not? He had raised others from the dead. Their last hope did not die until He expired and was taken down, limp and lifeless, from the cross.

Jesus' mother watched Him, her soul distracted and wounded deeper than any other person there. All the memories of His virgin birth, His miraculous life and undying promises must have come back to her troubled mind. But she finally, too, had to accept the words, "Woman, behold thy son," directing her to John's attention, and "Son, behold thy mother," as Christ's last words of earthly care. He would not descend from the cross and walk back to Jerusalem that day, this she knew deep within herself.

The great multitudes of common people watched Him. One of the best friends they had was now dying. He had bealed many of them, taught them the most wonderful words ever heard, fed them when hungry and blessed their children in sunnier hours than this. Now, He was dy-

"But Abishai the son of Zeruiah answered and said, "Shall not Shemei be put to death for this, because he cursed the Lord's anointed." I Sam. 19:21

How many people would be put to death in our Holiness Churches today if the old warrior, Abishai were to visit each of our churches.

As time sped along, Elizabeth grew up learning all the ways and customs of her people. Until one day when Elizabeth saw how nice and convenient it was to be able to do a "little magic".

And now with her mind made up, she would study it all and be a woman witch doctors. So she sold her soul to the spirit world, dedicating her life to the devil to do his work. To be an intercessor between the evil spirit world and her people with all their present day problems.

And so her life's work began. "Brave" was the name of her "evil spirit" that helped her in all of her ceremonies. Many, many were the curses bought, to help with all the problems, the sick, the mentally weak and those desiring to leave Haiti and find success in USA and other countries.
