Do You Enjoy Spiritual Prosperity?

"Teach me to do thy will; for thou art my God: thy spirit is good; lead me into the land of uprightness."

Psa. 143:10

How can I enjoy spiritual prosperity? The answer to this sincere heartcry is simply that choicest prosperity is the direct outcome of DOING God's will, not merely knowing it. This was evidently the glorious flash of spiritual insight which illumined the whole of the Psalmist's life. It instantly incited within him an ardent desire and earnest aspiration; then earnestly he entreated: "Teach me to do thy will." His passionate prayer was not merely to comprehend but to perform God's particular will for him own peculiar life. To do God's will, whatever the cost or consequences, provides the entrance into spiritual well-being.

The Psalmist's excited ejaculation readily reminds us of the Apostle Paul's interpretation of God's will: "For this is the will of God, even your sanctification."-I Thess. 4:3. Entire sanctification-the practical performance of God's will for us individually-embodies all that is required and involved in working out God's dearest designs for us. Such sanctified submission to God's plan and purpose results in choicest spiritual prosperity and happiness. To David, the doing of God's will plainly and simply meant living in "the land of uprightness." Spurgeon so aptly commented: "David would fain be among the godly, the land of another sort from that which had east him out. He sighed for the upland meadows of grace, the tablelands of peace, the fertile plains of communion. He could not reach them himself; he must be led there. God, who is good, can best conduct us to the goodly land. There is no inheritance like a portion of the land of promise, the land of precept, the land of perfectness."

Spiritually speaking, "the land of uprightness" simply signifies the plain, straight, narrow and upward way of holiness. The straight way of spiritual rectitude is in striking contrast to the crooked ways of the unsanctified, the winding ways of willfulness, selfish-choosing, and the frequent deviations from the highway of righteousness. In a previous Psalm, David expresses the same idea: "Teach me thy way, O Lord, and lead me in a plain path because of mine enemies (margin: "those that observe

me)."-Psa. 27:11. He suddenly realized that if he missed the Godmarked track he would surely fall and fail spiritually. Passionately, therefore, he pleads with God Himself to lead him in the straight and level way. Practically, "the land of uprightness" means a settled course of spiritual pilgrimage: consistent daily holy living. When we enter that spiritual state of uprightness of charcter and conduct, we walk with God in a manner of holy living which eventually leads to the Eternal Abode of the Upright. Only by being in full harmony with God's will, by having an attitude of mind and spirit in oneness with Christ, can we enjoy God's choicest blessing of spiritual prosperity. Only thus can we enter "a land which the Lord thy God careth for: the eyes of the Lord thy God are always upon it, from the beginning of the year even unto the end of the year." - Deut. 11:12. Charles Wesley exquisitely expresses this spiritual prosperity:

A land of corn, and wine, and oil, Favoured with God's peculiar smile, With every blessing blest; And keeps His own in perfect peace There dwells the Lord our

Righteousness, And everlasting rest.

Not merely did David perceive this sublime spiritual prospect, not only did he ardently yearn for the possession and enjoyment, but he clearly saw the door by which to enter in. Knowing full well that of his own skill and recourses he was utterly helpless and totally incapable of reaching the door, he looked eagerly, appealingly and trustingly to his great Guide and Enabler and cried: "Teach me to do thy will, thy spirit is good. Lead me into the land of uprightness." God's Holy Spirit is the saved man's teacher; He will assuredly lead him into all truth and into the state of sanctification-spiritual prosperity. How true, too, that we ourselves, despite all our endowments, are so spiritually shortsighted, so spiritually illiterate, so spiritually insufficient that we can never arrive at the promised land of holiness. Despite all our native virtues and graces, we of ourselves will never be able to work out thoroughly

the will of God for and in our lives.

In a remarkable passage of Scripture, we have a most heartening description of God's graciousness and generous provision enabling man to reach the spiritual state of sanctification wherein is spiritual prosperity. "Thou in thy manifold mercies," Nehemiah affirms, "forsookest them not in the wilderness: the pillar of cloud departed not from them by day, to lead them in the way; neither the pillar of fire by night, to show them light, and the way wherein they should go. Thou gavest also thy good spirit to instruct them, and withheldest not thy manna from their mouth, and gavest them water for their thirst. Yea, forty years didst thou sustain them in the wilderness, so that they lacked nothing; their clothes-waxed not old, and their feet swelled not."-Neh. 9:14, 15. Little wonder that the Apostle burst out in a cry of complete confidence when he was filled with wonder, love and praise as he mediated upon God's limitless love and bountiful provision for His redeemed children-"He that spared not his own Son, but delievered him up for us all, how shall he not with him also freely give us all things?"-Rom. 8:32. Transcending immeasureably any material provision the Almighty Father has provided for the temporal pilgrimage of His chosen Israel is the spiritual provision He graciously and abundantly provides for the spiritual journey of His chosen people-those who are sanctified; those who in truth do God's will in their life.

Christ's crowning accomplishment on the cross, His triumphant resurrection, His glorious ascension, His victorious entry into His Father's house, and His elevated position at the right hand of God as Intercessor and High Priest, fulfilled the promise of the Holy Spirit to be given to us after His Ascension. The Holy Spirit is come to us to be our Sanctifier, Comforter, Sustainer, and Guide. Naturally, we are spiritually blind, spiritually ignorant, spiritually rebellious. We cannot walk spiritually straight. We certainly cannot make ourselves spiritually upright. We cannot alter our unregenerate and unsanctified

The Ninth Commandment

Thou shalt not bear false witness, Exodus 20:16

A group of women were freely discussing an absentee.

"She is so silly," said one.

"So slow," came a rejoinder.

"Lacking in taste," supplied a third.

"A bit bold, don't you think?" from another.

Then from one that had been strangely quiet came the comment, "She is always so agreeable."

This simple statement revealed a noble soul governed by the command, "Thou shalt not bear false witness."

False witnessing is not confined to courts of law, for most of us pass through life without having once appeared in court. But evil speaking is the form of false witnessing in which many thoughtless individuals indulge, as though it were a pleasant pastime.

This commandment prohibits slandering, backbiting, talebearing . . , and any way endeavoring to raise our own reputation upon the ruin of our neighbor's.

All whispering, talebearing, slander, and calumny; in a word, whatever is disposed as a truth, which is false in fact, and tends to injure another in his goods, person, or character, is against the spirit and letter of this law.

- Adam Clarke.

We are to be intense in our allegiance to truth. This will put us on our guard against certain tendencies to exaggerate when describing things or narrating events which would place another in a bad light, while at the same time we are made to appear as grand, wise, or noble.

Mental reservation, double meaning, significant silence, the end justifying the means, and all kindred evasions, may quiet a troubled conscience, but they will never be permitted in the life of the man who is living according to this Ninth Commandment.

A lie of whatever nature or color is abhorrent to God. We had better suffer the sting and humiliation of defeat by adherence to truth than to triumph by the practice of falsehood. There is a success that is not worth what it costs.

False witness may be embodied in accurate speech. We may use true words and yet create a false impression. The intonation or inflection of the voice, the shrug of the shoulder, the lifting of the eyebrow may convey a different meaning than that intended by the original speaker. Dean Alford said: Truth does not consist in minute accuracy of detail, but in conveying a right impression.

False witness may be borne by silence. When considering a man's reputation, silence is often most eloquent. "He could have spoken," it is argued, "had he been able to say anything favorable." An innocent man may serve a long prison sentence, suffering untold agony, because some one remained silent.

Reputation is one of our most valuable possessions, but the preserving of it is largely in our neighbor's keeping. Anyone can touch and, to a certain degree, smear the reputation and rob another of this priceless possession.

A man guilty of gossip and slander is guilty of throwing stones when he should be dodging them. He is a breeder of strife, a peddler of carrion, a photographer of garbage wagons.

The slanderer is in the class with the blasphemer. He is more dangerous than the highwayman, lower than the purse-snatcher, and more despicable than the idolater. He is a liar, a sneak thief, a murderer, a despoiler of purity, all wrapped up in one bundle.

A man that beareth false witness against his neighbor is a maul, and a sword, and a sharp arrow, Proverbs 25:18.

The scandal monger dishonors his parents, defies God and ruins his neighbor. His example is fearful, his character is black; the impulses of his heart are sordid and devilish — "Fearful will be his damnation unless he repents in sackcloth and ashes."

Says R.A. Torry:

Unless we are to break the law of God, there are four things that we must do; First, Never believe anything that we hear against another, until it is absolutely proven to be true; Second, Believe no more than is fully proven; Third, When we are compelled to believe it, keep it to ourselves unless plain duty demands that we tell it; Fourth, When you must tell it, tell it exactly as it is.

Let every reader be very sure that the Holy Spirit has cleansed his heart from that evil pollution called the carnal mind from whence flow bitter envies and strife. On the day of Pentecost the 120 had their hearts cleansed by the baptism with the Holy Ghost. That is God's provision which enables a man to live in full obedience to this command.

Missionary Message

One Half Year in Haiti

At the time of this writing I have spent six (6) months on the mission field. I believe I can say it's been the most enjoyable, most frustrating, most rewarding, most fatiguing, and most challenging six (6) months of my life. I have encountered a new people, a new language, and a new culture. I have seen a government topple, seen the thirst of the Haitian people for freedom, and at the same time seen near anarchy emerge and the very depths of human depravity. I have shared the grief of these people over the loss of loved ones, and rejoiced with those restored to health. It has been a time of growth for me, a time of deep introspection. I can see that we face some real problems. Problems that are beyond the scope of man's abilities to resolve. I can see that we need God in a way almost beyond describing. It's only with His help we can hope to change anything here. If we work solely in our own strengths and abilities. Haiti will never know we were ever here. I am confident that with God's direction and our obedience to that direction we can accomplish some good here. In six months I have acquired many questions. I can't say yet that I've found as many answers. There are times yet when I'm not sure I even understand the questions, but progress is being made. I would like to share a few of these areas with you.

First, we are making progress with the language. That has to be the most frustrating aspect of going to a foreign field. It's worse than selling all your possessions, it's worse than being homesick by far. Inability to communicate! No wonder you can't solve any problems! Now after six solid months of frustration I am beginning to understand and to be understood. What a wonderful feeling. It's wonderful to be able to eat at God's table where the bread is in Creole and to get a few bites!

This language barrier is a real obstacle in our work at the clinic. Initially I couldn't see a single patient on my own. Now I see many without the aid of a translator. Oh I still get stuck frequently, but if I can't explain it another way, then Miss Wing can help me out. Those who work in U.S. clinics would be amazed to see how many people we see. The variety of

things the day holds is almost frightning. Herein lies another frustration.

Coming from a U.S. hospital to a rural clinic in Haiti is a change indeed. I worked in a small rural TN hospital where I often complained about old equipment and other inconveniences. What I wouldn't give to have that hospital here! Sometimes when you get started on a job you never know what you're going to need to finish it. Now if it's your car you're working on, that's not so bad. You can stop for a day or two and wait for parts or tools to arrive, but not so with people. God is helping in this area too. One learns to make do, to adapt, and God is helping us to acquire some of the things we need. There are times when prayer becomes the deciding factor in the course of some patients. The potential for reaching Haitian souls through the clinic is unlimited. It is a wide open door, and scarely a clinic day goes by without that door of opportunity being used.

No real change is going to be made in the Health of our LaCroix people until (1) they find Jesus. - that in itself causes them to improve hygiene etc. (2) We can get ahead of the continual remedial medicine and start practicing preventive medicine. At this point we are vainly trying to keep ahead of treating anthrax, to the point we can't tell the community how to prevent it. We treat poisoned children, but don't have time to tell the parents not to put it in old pop bottles, which causes another problem, because it's usually the only kind of container they have. The problem seems to be where to begin! (3) We can improve our facilities to better and more efficiently treat what does come through the door. Perhaps the job sounds hopeless, but I believe GMC in Haiti can make a difference, if we have the full support of GMC in America plus God. I'm going to be content with my frustrations so long as we are making progress in the right direction. Rome wasn't built in a day.

The reward of the past six months have been many, enough so that I don't feel like going back home. I have seen God's Hand on our lives. I have seen Him perform miracles, and I believe I am seeing many more souls won for Jesus Christ, than I ever would have in the states. This is

where God has called me. The challenge is great. There is more to do than we can get done. We fall asleep exhausted each night, but each morning God gives a refreshing and endues us with power, for whatever lies ahead.

Many problems, many uncertainties, and only one God. But what a God! What an opportunity for GMC! My prayer is that God will give GMC a new sense of loyalty-that she will realize she has a mission of importance in the world. May each member be in accord with Jesus Christ the head, so that all will share the eternal rewards. God willing, someday I want to write about my first six months in Heaven! No problems or frustration there! One of Your Haitian Harvesters,

My call to the gospel ministry came while attending a camp meeting just following World War Two. Across the years it has been a joy to make my way with my family to the camp meeting when the season arrives. My three children feel this is a very important part of their lives. This is understandable because they have attended camp since birth. My eldest daughter has attended sixteen camps having missed only her first year. My youngest daughter has attended each of the twelve years of her life. My son has attended all three years of his life. This July will complete four years as president of the Cumberland Grove Camp Meeting at Jamestown, Tennessee. So I speak with conviction when I say that the camp meeting fills a valuable place in the Holiness Move-

Its value and importance must be determined in the light of true spiritual benefits to all who attend, both local worshipers who live in the camp area and visiting campers who often come for many miles to enjoy the spiritual feast and also help to carry the burden for lost souls. Any who have gone through the few days of an old fashioned camp meeting will be quick to say there are real spiritual benefits for those who come to be blessed and to be a blessing. We can see its value in the powerful and

beneficial effects upon our youth, many of whom have come to know Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour at a holiness camp. In thinking of its value we must keep in mind its promotion of better morals and a higher standard as regards to our relationship with our fellow man. These are values that cannot be bought with a price. This is true especially in these days of spiritual darkness, moral degradation and unrest between men and the nations of the world. We may not be able to change the world or even hope to turn the drift of the church from worldliness but we can by the grace of God do all in our power by promoting camps of the kind that will give men a fresh vision of the Christ who is the hope of mankind and the prince of peace.

Year in and year out God has seen fit to manifest himself on grounds made holy by His presence and among His people. Such love, such great mercy, such power as has been shown through the years, can handle be described in mere words. Could we doubt God's will and plan after such divine visitation.

The purpose of the camp finds its answer in the need for God's people to meet and worship. Nothing can strengthen the souls of men more than worship of God while in fellowship with his brethren. Its purpose is made known by the sea of lost souls lapping at our shores. Many have found God, but oh! the need is ever present with us, lost souls waiting to be saved. How we can be

satisfied to go on pleasure trips and vacations at the expense of our Holiness Camps I am unable to understand. In recent months a Holiness minister said to me on my invitation to attend camp. "I don't think I will attend camp this year as I want to get away somewhere and rest; sleep until I am ready to get up and just relax in general." This is a sad condition indeed, when holiness people would rather sleep then win souls, rather relax than to carry a burden for the lost.

Its message is, "Christ and Him crucified." We must lift Him up. By so doing sin will be exposed and men will be reproved of wrong doing. Truth has a sharp edge, sharp as a surgeon's knife, cutting away that which is decayed, and destroying that which is evil of all that fastens itself upon the souls of men. It is a message of, "Holiness without which no man shall see the Lord," Hebrews 12:14. This is our need and there is no substitute. It is the need of mankind. Our Holiness Camps should be dedicated to preach this message with no uncertain sound.

When we in America cease to support the churches and institutions that point men to God and tend to lift to a higher plain, then it will not be long until we will be living on the animal level. Denying God's truth and the principles embraced in His holy word.

By all means the camp meeting has a place in the holiness movement of today. Let us stand by with our prayers, attendance and support.

On the night of April 14, 1912, John Jacob Astor stood on the deck of the stricken ship, Titanic. At his feet lay a lifeboat, and racing toward his rescue was the Cunard Liner, Carpathia. A mansion crowded with palatial appointments awaited his return to New York City. But he knew that if he took that lifeboat to safety, every embellished wall and frescoed ceiling, every flowing fountain and crystal chandelier, every Oriental rug and ivory vase from India, would forever echo the voices of the women and children sinking beneath the swirling waters of the North Atlantic. He loved life but he could not afford to enjoy it at that price! He stepped aside and gave his seat of survival to some unknown person. He wrote the name of Astor in imperishable glory of that unforgettable night!

There are some things in life that we may all wish to have, positions we would like to obtain, places we would like to go, and heights to which we would like to climb. But if the way to these things is at the price of someone else's happiness or success, if they cost us deeds of which we will live to be ashamed, or words or actions we will later deeply regret, they are too expensive.

Many a person has achieved fame, riches, power, or prestige at the expense of the weaker, less fortunate, or more conscientious of whom he took advantage. But oh, what memories must haunt such a person in their lonely hours alone!

When we compromise with our better selves to achieve anything or to please anyone, we are settling too cheaply for life's best goals.

Dr. Clarence E. McCartney, the golden-mouthed Presbyterian minister of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, once told a story of a minister put on the spot during a political campaign in which liquor was the main issue. Two of his wealthy parishioners invited him for a game of golf. Away down the course they told him they had asked him for this game to talk with him about his attitude, and that of the church, during this campaign. "We want you to keep silent about the liquor issue," they said. "Why?" he asked. They explained that it was for the good of the church.

"At the rate I am preaching and working," the minister replied, "it will not be long before I have to retire. I shall be living on a small pension in a little cottage in some small town. But I must live with yourself, and if I took the route that you men want me to take, I would be in hell a hundred times before I die!"

Blessed is the man who so conducts his life as to have nothing to regret.

What about our lives and our actions under pressure? Are we settling too cheaply? Trying to please, are we compromising with principles that we shall some day wish a thousand times in one minute that we had not done? Is the price we are paying for the things we want out of life too great for the final goals it will bring us?

If we are living in such a manner or doing anything that will embarrass us in the hour of death, or stand in our way at the judgment, we had better mend our ways while there is a chance to do so. Tomorrow may be too late. We had better act today.
