

Editorial

REFLECTION AND RESOLUTION

God's Missionary Church is not yet one hundred years old. As far as denominations go, our 1935 birthday makes our church young. And yet, at this momentous year 2000, it is time to reflect and resolve.

We reflect on years of stability. Our sixty five years of ministry has certainly not been without misunderstanding and occasional division. Yet, the record is clear. God's Missionary Church has never suffered a split or been part of a 'come-out' movement. The leadership of George Straub, Truman Wise and Paul Miller, combined with present leadership have given a steady hand to the affairs of state.

We reflect on years of service. In local congregations, through our Bible college and around the world in missionary evangelism have spread members of God's Missionary Church for the proclamation of the Gospel. In Castro's Cuba, in Mongolian orphanages, behind the wall of poverty in Haiti, in the heathen culture of Africa and Taiwan and beyond, members of God's Missionary Church have served well.

We reflect on years of spirituality. The doctrine remains pure. The convictions remain clear. The Weslevan Methodist heritage is alive at the turn of a millennium. Though constant barbs and sneers have made the conservative holiness movement a defensive collection of organizations, God's Missionary Church stands as a bright oasis of conservatism with a cause. The vision of humble Pennsylvania dutchmen has contributed to a denomination leading the way for evangelism, outreach and piety.

We reflect. It is not wrong to reflect. It is good to look back and say "To God be the Glory Great Things He Has Done!"

But if we only reflect, we have lost the battle before it begins. If we only look back and only remember and only recall, we have ceased to exist as a church. We must also RESOLVE!

At this dawning age, we resolve to see the Kingdom of God advanced. We resolve to see the world brought to the knowledge of the Savior. We resolve to lift our heads high and march into the battle under the banner of the KING OF KINGS AND LORD OF LORDS. He transcends millenniums. He tells time by eternity's. If the church shall stay under His banner, the outcome of the battle is sure. The Old Ship of Zion sails on. Defeat is not in the vocabulary! 🚨

Facing the new century, with its challenge to hold high the banner of holiness, in a world growing increasingly pagan, our church has a great need of the Presence. We can say like Moses of old when ordered to go forward, "If thy Presence go not with me, carry us not up hence."

At the dedication of Solomon's temple we read, "Now when Solomon had made an end of praying, the fire came down from heaven and consumed the burnt offering and the sacrifices, and the glory of the Lord filled the house, and the priest could not enter into the house of the Lord, because the glory of the Lord had filled the Lord's house." What made it a great hour? The temple? No. The people? No. The priest? No. The glory, the Presence did! The results of the Presence coming upon the scene was, the people bowed themselves with their faces to the ground, worshiping and praising God.

See Eilijah, on Mount Carmel, surrounded by unbelievers. With a faith strong in the Presence he prayed. The Presence came. The Baalites were confounded. The people, convicted and convinced by the Presence, cried out, "The Lord, he is god."

It was the Presence at Pentecost that caused the unbelieving world to stop, look and listen. It will be the Presence with us in the new century that stops the mad rush of our world. Nothing short of this will avail.

The Presence must be honored, invited, welcomed, for He will not force Himself upon any person or congregation.

In The Life and Times of Hedding, Lorenzo

Dow relates of Mr. Mitchell, "When he began to exhort a trembling began among the unconverted. First one, then another, fell from their seats and began to cry for mercy. The influence spread till the cry became general; and for eleven hours there was no cessation of the loud cries and supplications of that smitten assembly... The most abandoned, profligate, wicked men, the caviling, skeptical deist, the blaspheming atheist, the brawling universalist, were alike humbled at the foot of the cross, and by the power of divine grace were at length renewed and clothed in their right mind."

Whitefield's Journal of 1842 says, "After I had begun, the Spirit of the Lord gave me freedom, till at length it came down like a mighty rushing wind and carried all before it. Immediately the whole congregation was alarmed. Shrieking, crying, weeping, and wailing were to be heard in every corner, men's hearts failing them for fear."

What was the cause of such meetings? The Presence was upon them.

Mr. Watson in *The Life of Wesley* says, "He (Mr. Wesley) unquestionably believed in special effusions of the influence of the Holy Spirit upon congregations and individuals, producing powerful emotions of mind, expressed in some instances of bodily affections."

President Edwards says this in regard to "The Great Awakening," "Wherever these appear, the (physical signs of God moving upon the

heart), there is always the greatest and deepest work."

Bangs in his History of the Methodist Church says. "As these abated, the work of conviction and conversion usually abated too."

In the words of another Methodist of the old stamp, let me say, "It is the divine, spiritual influence which is the cause of these things for

which we plead; and if such experiences follow as incidental results insofar as they are purely involuntary, and the work of the Spirit, let them come!"

It has been said, "Our God is a God of order and not of confusion." True indeed. Yet in attempting to prescribe the modes in which the Presence shall act, we fetter his operations, and as a result we reap barrenness and drought. This is true in the individual life, and also in a denomination.

S. H. Pratt says, "Order, indeed!

What is order, if following the impulses of the Holy Spirit is not? Does God's Spirit need to be taught politeness by the cold, impassive frigidities of modern conventionalism? Is an 'Amen,' or a 'Hallelujah," or a smile or a tear such an unpardonable violation of religious decorum that it must be banished from our sanctuaries forever? We may try the ostracism, but, remember, God's Spirit will go with the ex-


iled expressions of His influence... while His work is that of God, He will work like a God, untrammeled by the notions of men! the church, from history, has a valuable lesson for us on this point."

What does the new century hold for us? Untold accomplishments in the advancement of the Kingdom of God, if we keep His Presence with us.



Dream Comes True

From the earliest days at Penn View Bible Institute, the college campus resembled 'dust city' or 'mud city' depending on the weather. Many have dreamed to see a remedy for this problem. Various alternatives have been explored across the years, but no project was completed due to the overwhelming financial cost that made paving unattainable.

For the past few years, the college has undergone an extensive construction project. This academic year, the first floor of the new men's dormitory was occupied. With the use of this facility, a major concern was the mud, dust and stones that would be tracked on to the beautiful floor covering that was generously donated. Due to these concerns, prices were pursued to have the campus paved. As the prices were received, again the project seemed impossible.

The board discussed the matter thoroughly and came to a decision to pursue the project by faith. Larry Kratz, a professional surveyor and friend of the college, began working on ways to create additional parking. With the expertise of he and his staff, the lower campus was redesigned to include 180 parking spaces. The student parking on upper campus was enlarged so as to accommodate nearly 40 vehicles.

Friends of Penn View began pledging finances for the project, and the contractor was notified to begin paving. In fact, the response was so overwhelming that the entire campus was slated for paving and by the third week of November the pavement project was completed, just three weeks before the asphalt plant was closed for the winter. The entire parking areas were then lined and continued work is being done on sidewalks in the area of the cafeteria building.

At the time of this report, all but \$7,000.00 has been raised for the project. We praise the Lord for His blessings! A long standing dream has come true!


School Walls Go Up in Leogone

Two work teams have successfully labored on the new school building in Leogone, Haiti.

On October 18, Rev. Brian Bright, pastor of the Felton GMC along with two men from his church; Ron Black and George Hedges as well as Sis. Bright and the children paid their own way to Haiti to pour the footers and lay out the new school building. Borrowing gasoline run cement mixers from a neighboring mission helped the task to get done a lot easier. Where this building is being built there are no modern conveniences such as electricity, phone

of prayer. God caused the rain to stop and the work went on. This work team returned to the US on October 26. All went well. We want to say a big thank you to Bro. & Sis. Bright and their coworkers for the hard work done for the Lord and Haiti.

Nine days later Work Team #2 arrived safely. Rev. Aaron McCarty, assistant pastor of the Beavertown GMC along with six men and one lady from his church made up this team. They were: Ken Stanton, Scott Stanton, Jason Stanton, David Walter, Boyd Day, Gary Beachel and wife Virginia. The church graciously provided the airfare for their people. This team's responsibilities were to lay the blocks for the footer, pour the floors, and build the walls for the 25' X 75' school building. The building will house four more



classrooms, also a principal's office and a supply room.

A big answer to prayer came when God turned Hurricane Lloyd and no rain fell where the building project was in progress. All around received rain. We serve a Great God! Praise His Name!

After a week of hard labor under the hot Haitian sun the walls were completed. This group of men is to be commended for their hard, steady work. Three of the men who are welders volunteered to stay four additional days and weld the trusses, windows and doors. Unknown to all of us a tragedy awaited the Stantons upon their arrival home. In the night hours preceding their take-off from Haiti Bro. Stanton's home caught fire and burned down. He came home to a great loss. We are trusting Romans 8:28 to prove true through all of this. Fortunately his wife and son were not injured in the blaze.

Future work teams plan to complete the building in 2000.

On the Front Lines

FELTON, DELAWARE REPORT

The Home Missionary Department is encouraged at new people attending the God's Missionary Church in Felton, Delaware. This church, under the direction of Rev. Brian Bright has been started from 'scratch.' At a recent visit by Home Missionary Superintendent Rev. John F. White, it was reported that a new family from New England had been attending and a lady recently had been saved. "We left the Felton church greatly encouraged with our heart warmed," Rev. White reported.

350 LBS. of DONATED ITEMS TRANSPORTED TO HAITI

The Beavertown Work Team carried seven suitcases of donated items into Haiti. This included children's clothing, shoes, medicine, medical supplies, car parts, and a donated accordion. Upon their arrival three airport personnel "happened" to be in the airport who knew our missionaries. They helped the group through without the hassle of inspections and duty. Another approx. 300 lbs. is awaiting future work teams to transport it in to the benefit of the poor Haitian families.

FT. MYERS REVIVAL

It has been reported that sixteen men were converted in a recent revival at the Fort Myers Rescue Mission in Fort Myers, Florida. Richard McClure, a mission worker, reports this to be the largest number who have been saved since his working at the mission. -Ropeholders

TAIWAN EARTHQUAKE

GMC Missionaries Bradley and Anita Halter working with FEA Missions, report on the recent earthquake in that nation. "The earthquake of September 21 was centered in Puli, a town which is famous as the geographical center of Taiwan. It is the least-evangelized county in Taiwan and is a stronghold of idolatry. This stronghold of idolatry has been shaken... Christian workers report an unusual openness to the Gospel as never before seen in Puli. Pray that this stronghold will not only be shaken but cast down.




CHAD W. MOWERY
