# PILGRIMS BLOODWASHED by Joyce Cauthon

"These all died in faith, not having received the promises, but having seen them afar off, and were persuaded of them, and embraced them, and confessed that they were strangers and pilgrims on the earth" (Hebrew 11:13).

The definition of a Pilgrim is: "one who travels," or "a wanderer." Abraham became a Pilgrim when he obeyed God and left home, kindred, and the way of life that looked the easiest, to wander in a strange land.

Moses became a Pilgrim when he chose to suffer affliction with the children of God, and refused all the wealth, prestige, and comforts of life which being called the son of Pharaoh's daughter could have afforded. From that time on he wandered in strange lands, always traveling with the Promised Land in view.

In 1620, a group of people left the shores of England for the shores of a foreign land. They were called Pilgrims, or Separatists. They had been severely persecuted in England prior to this time, because they would not conform to the worldliness and formality that had crept into the Church of England. They had started their own services in order to follow the dictates of their consciences, and maintain religious freedom for themselves. This act branded

them as nonconformists.

Those Pilgrims had originally migrated to Holland from England where they were no longer persecuted for their beliefs, and were allowed to support their families through various occupations. The time soon came, however, when they realized that their young people were going to learn the Dutch language, marry into Dutch families, and that the beliefs they were fighting for would gradually become extinct. This led the Pilgrims to give up the security and homes they had in England to board ships for a strange land called America.

Two ships left England's shores that day, the Speedwell and the Mayflower; however, the crew of the Speedwell soon considered their ship unseaworthy, so both ships put back to port. It was learned that the crew of the Speedwell were desirous simply to avoid the hazards of such a journey. The crew of the Mayflower still had freedom of worship burning in their souls, and the ship set sail alone.

This pilgrimage was taken, not with the view of improving their fortunes, but to develop their love of liberty and God. Money was of little account in comparison with character.

While the Mayflower was still rocking at anchor near Cape Cod. The men met in the cabin, drew up and signed an agreement promising, "In the presence of God and one another...all due submission and obedience" to such laws as they might find it necessary to enact. The signers are known as the Pilgrim Fathers.

After the first winter, although half of their original number lay in the little burying ground, not a voice was raised in proposal of returning to England. The people decided to have a feast of ingathering-a day of thanksgiving. It was to be a day of thanks for the fact that they were free and able to worship God according to their own consciences, a day of thanks that God had brought them through the hard places, and thanks for those who had given their lives for the cause they were fighting for.

And God still has His faithful Pilgrims:

PILGRIMS-Bloodwashed, and heading for the shores of a Country they have read about, have had a foretaste of, and are longing to see.

PILGRIMS-Who have seen other ships start out at the same time as their own, and turn back. (Other Pilgrims decided their ship was unseaworthy. They discovered that they didn't want to stem the tide of sin and worldliness. They didn't want the waves of ridicule beating on their ship. They didn't want to face the loneliness, out in the middle

of the ocean, when they had taken their stand against laxness, shading the truth, wrong attitudes, loose living, and the enemy coming in like a flood.)

PILGRIMS-Putting their ships back out in the ocean of opposition, even though it means leaving lifelong friends, relatives, position, and good jobs.

PILGRIMS-Not feeling at home in this world, or in any atmosphere of the world-recognizing the enemy trying to make them comfortable around a crowd that is trying to get their sons and daughters to speak their language (which isn't a Pilgrim's language), and to become involved to the extent that they can't break away.

PILGRIMS-With enough respect to submit and obey the things their forefathers stood for, and agreed upon, while our organization was rocking at anchor near its beginning.

PILGRIMS—With enough of the grace of God, and backbone big enough, to look over a battlefield, view the burying place of those who have stood in the gap, fought for the truth, been shot at, and have gone Home to Heaven with the glory on their souls—and not raise a voice to propose retreat even an inch from where they stand!

HALLELUJAH!-I'M A PIL-GRIM EVERMORE!

## A NEW School Year Commences

he kick-off of the 2002-03 school year began with Welcome Night. Students, staff, parents, and friends gathered to hear Rev. Greg Hobelman--ministerial graduate of 2001and pastor of the God's Missionary Church, Sunbury, PA--challenge the new and returning students to give their best to God!

Yes, another school year is underway. Penn View Christian Academy (K4 through 12) has 183 students. 105 of those students are in the High School (7-12) alone!. Some students came into the Academy from as far away as western Pennsylvania, New York, Ohio, Tennessee, Indiana, and even the countries of Papua New Guinea and Germany!

The Institute welcomes 127 students this year. The second-highest enrollment total in the history of Penn View. This is only 6 students from tying last year's all-time PVBI attendance record! The emphasis of the school this year was not to break another record. Yes, a solid enrollment was desired. However, time and energy was given to other areas of Penn View development so there are ongoing advances in the recruitment and academic programs.



Africa]. God was good to us, and His hand of protection was evident as we navigated through elephants, hyenas, deer, cows, donkeys, etc., which decorated the roads of the countries in which we traveled. Many miles were traveled during the night hours without incident, and we give God all the glory! One stretch of road, approximately 90 miles, took us 6 hours to cover. I think when it was all said and done, we might have driven about 150 miles on this 90 mile stretch as a result of crossing the road so many times in a futile attempt to avoid the "never ending" arrangement of "serious" pot holes!


We met with Christians in Zimbabwe, Botswana,
Namibia, and Zambia. We also met and conversed with
a young man from Malawi who is working with the
Muslims. I am absolutely confounded by all the open
doors, the hunger for the Gospel, and the lack of
laborers!

The group we work with in Zimbabwe is an indigenous work. We don't want to step in and make these people dependent on us and destroy the indigenous work; however, they do need Biblical training, and they are open and hungry for it. We were with this group of people for a weekend conference, and as we taught about walking with God and living a holy life, they were so open and receptive. Brother Marais commented that out of all the conferences he had attended in Africa, this one had the best spirit about it. The people were beautiful because of God's Spirit! They are facing hard times because of the government's policies and the result of a serious drought that has affected that area. However, they were rejoicing in Jesus! It was definitely a beautiful, yet sobering experience as we worshiped with this group of Shona people in the heart of Zimbabwe!

We then traveled on, spending a few days in Botswana and then heading to Namibia for another conference with the Mbukushu people. Years ago the Mbukushu people fled from Angola as a result of the war (which now is coming to an end), and settled up and down the Kavango River in Namibia. (By the way, after years of closed doors because of war, it looks like by next year the doors will be open for us to go into Angola with the Gospel! What an awesome opportunity--if we only had more laborers!) These Mbukushu people have been ravaged by the effects of the war and have resorted to "drinking their sorrows away!" These are the people who I wrote about last year, who sit around drinking home made beer. Adults, young people, and children join in the drinking, and as a result much wickedness takes

place. In the midst of all this, God has His people!

We are working with several churches in this region who have "come out from among their own people," and have been changed by Jesus Christ! After walking from house to house (selling Bibles, handing out tracts, etc.), and sometimes even walking right into the midst of the chaos of



drinking parties—after hearing drums beat out their sounds to the witch doctors will, and after seeing the filth as a result of sin, it was so refreshing to step into a church full with young people with their eyes closed and their arms raised as the worshiped my King Jesus! God has His people, even in the midst of the devastated Mbukushu people, and yet, they need training. We did our best in the three days that we were there to teach and preach; however, they need so much more help....

We then carried on, and met with some Christians in Zambia. Glenn Gault and I, as well as Brother Jim Howard and Brother Joe Taylor then parted from Brother Marais, and we started back to South Africa after stopping by the Majestic Victoria Falls. Brother Marias and two of our national pastors stayed in Zambia to do about another 8 days of mission work among the Lozi people. Glenn and I left Brother Howard and Brother Taylor in Johannesburg to catch a flight back to the States, and we proceeded with our journey, arriving in Ladybrand, Thursday night around 6:30 PM.

I praise the Lord for all of His Blessings during the trip.

God is so Good! I believe the trip was a success in the light of eternity. However, what can really be done to make strong disciples of the Cross in four different countries during a period of two weeks? After this trip, I believe I have a better vision of the Great Harvest Field, and the need for laborers!

Thank you so much for all of your prayers. God answers prayer! May God bless you all!


Susan worked with Christian

island country of Vanuatu. He will be doing that missionary work in conjunction with the missions society of the PNG Bible Church.


# Remembering The Attack

merica —yea, the world— is facing tumultuous times in light of the terrorist attacks in New York City, Washington, DC, and in the air over Pennsylvania. Many pundits are offering their commentaries why America was attacked. The debate will continue for years to come.

To commemorate that fateful day of September 11, 2001, Penn View held a special chapel service on the first anniversary of the attacks. Special singing included "The Star-Spangled Banner" (Kim Deaton, soloist), "God Bless America" (Michael Mason & Heritage), "The Statue of Liberty" (Mary Rine, soloist), and "Please Don't Let Another Nation Die" (Barry Mason, Dan & Michelle Durkee).

During the singing of God Bless America, a special slide presentation was viewed containing pictures of the attacks, the aftermath, the "rebounding spirit" of America, as well as other significant historical photos. Leah McCormick shared a touching story of a hero on that tragic day.

Phone interviews were made to the three crash areas of 9/11. Tom Kiser was called in his mid-town Manhattan office. He was in Manhattan the day of the attacks. Jonathan Witter—son of the Vice President of Financial Development, Robert Witter—works for the Department of Defense across from the Pentagon. During the phone contact with him, he informed the chapel crowd of the atmosphere there near the Pentagon. Alumnus Rev. David Walter provided a phone report from the Shanksville, PA. crash site. Steven Mowery—Director of Missions—was interviewed by the Master of Ceremonies, Dan Durkee, concerning the scenes and the ceremonial events taking place at "Ground Zero" itself. Mr. Mowery was there in New York City for the first anniversary memorial activities.

Special prayer was given for the nation, the national leaders, and those still grieving the loss of loved ones in the attacks. This special chapel helped the students, faculty, staff, and

focus upon the Help of Today and the Hope for Tomorrow. Jesus Christ!



















## The Planned GIVING

for such long-range planning and involvement.



# Unto the Lord!

"In that day shall there be upon the bells of the horses, HOLINESS UNTO THE LORD . . ." (Zechariah 14:20a).

"Holiness unto the Lord." I am afraid these are some of the most misunderstood words.

When we mention holiness, a lot of people immediately think of some oddities or eccentricities, or a lot of things that have been erroneously connected with the holiness movement. But those things are not holiness unto the Lord. Holiness is a characteristic of God. He said, "Ye shall be holy; for I the Lord your God am holy." The thing that sets God apart from every heathen deity is His holiness. Then, too, holiness is in the eternal purpose of God. "He hath chosen us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before him in love." The same theme runs through the redemption promises of God. "The oath which he sware to our father Abraham, that he would grant unto us, that we being delivered out of the hand of our enemies might serve him without fear, in holiness and righteousness before him, all the days of our life."

Then we find holiness in the great provision of Jesus Christ in the Atonement. "Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it; that he might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word, that he might present it to himself a glorious church, not having spot or wrinkle, or any such thing, but that it should be holy and without blemish." Again God tells us that holiness will characterize those who have part in the Rapture, "Blessed and holy is he that hath part in the first resurrection. On such the second death hath no power." Here in Zechariah we find that holiness is characteristic of God's description of the Millennium, and continuing in eternity runs this perennial theme of holiness unto the Lord.

When men have characterized their ideal environment, they have described it by such things as plenty, freedom from labor, etcetera, but such are the Utopias of earth. I think that many times we have missed the idea of what Heaven is going to be. To many folks, Heaven is simply a summer

resort for laziness. But that is not what God says. He says it is "holiness unto the Lord."

If we can find out something about what it is going to mean then, maybe we can see what it means now. There are two aspects of holiness—a negative and a positive aspect.

What is the positive side? "There shall be no more curse: but the throne of God and of the Lamb shall be in it; and his servants shall serve him; and they shall see his face; and his name shall be in their foreheads." There you have itholiness unto the Lord is separation from everything that is unclean, sinful, and profane. There is no more fearful revelation to man than that of the holiness of God.

In the Old Testament we read of the thunderings of Sinai; but that does not give us a full revelation of the holiness of God. I believe if we are going to get a good view of that holiness, its greatest revelation is not on Mount Sinai but on Mount Calvary. There is a revelation of the love of God. No place in all the universe reveals that love of God as Calvary does; but no place reveals the holiness of God as Calvary does, either. It reveals God's estimation of sin; it shows us that God does not regard sin as a light, insignificant thing. I believe it was Bishop Moore of the Methodist Church who said, "The tendency of this day is to humanize God, to deify man, and to minimize sin."

Many look at sin as an error, a mistake, a blunder, a weakness; but God looks at it as a dark, loathsome, dreadful thing, the atonement for which took the blood of His Son. That is God's estimate of sin. If God could help us to see that every sin-little sin, popular sin, and all other sincost the life of His Son, we would see not only

God's estimation of sin but also God's uncompromising attitude toward sin. God will not compromise, and Calvary shows us that He will not. Sin must be done away with in its entirety. God would have His Son pay the price of redemption by death on the cross rather than to compromise with sin. If anything would cause God Almighty to let one bit of sin go unnoticed, it would have been to spare the life of His Son; but God was willing to give His Son to die. Do you think that God Almighty is going to compromise with one little bit of sin in you? Do you think God is going to excuse that thing you are covering or excusing?

The first thing we see about the revelation of God's holiness on Calvary is God's utter refusal to fellowship with sin. Jesus Christ cried out in the agony of His soul, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" God Almighty had to turn His face when His Son took the sins of the lost world upon Him. "He who knew no sin became sin for us." God forsook Him. Do you think that God is going to fellowship with you or me, if we have sin in our hearts and lives, when He turned His face from His own Son who took sin upon Him? Do you think we can glibly and lightly testify of belonging to God and of walking with God when there is sin in our lives? If God turned His face from His dying Son Who took sin upon Himself, do not deceive yourself into thinking that God will fellowship with you. What a revelation of the holiness of God!


