

Christ, and seemed to have little interest in God at all. One days as Kimball was praying for his class, he was prompted by the Holy Spirit to visit Moody, then a teenager, at his workplace. Kimball went to where Moody was working and shared the Gospel with him. Kimball went away from the meeting disheartened, feeling like he had failed. But Moody was transformed that day! Moody went on to become one of the greatest evangelists in the world, preaching and witnessing to millions of people around the world.

Kimball wasn't a dynamic preacher or missionary; he simply obeyed God. And his simple obedience to one was multiplied in abundance.

Moody wrote a book titled To the Work! To the Work! and in it he wrote: "It is far better to get a hundred men to work than to do the work oneself." His goal in writing this book that has become a classic was to encourage believers to the work of the kingdom in order to see movement in the church.

This issue of the Standard is titled "So send I You. It is the title of what is called one of the finest missionary hymns that was ever written. And while this issue focuses on world missions, it is imperative that we get the message that God has called believers everywhere to share the Gospel! For some, it will be in Honduras where Eric and Hannah Kuhns are ministering. To others it will be in the Dominican Republic where Doug and Kim Hoffman are laboring for the kingdom. ### SO SEND I YOU

't had been a dark weekend. The disciples had just watched their Messiah die on a cross. Three years of miracles, teachings and unforgettable moments of inspiration all seemed Like a haze in the distant past. Jesus' incredible journey from the golden streets of glory to the dirt roads of Israel seemed to have ended in utter failure. But as the disciples sat huddled behind closed doors contemplating their sad estate and fearing for their lives, suddenly Jesus stood before them. In an instant, their sadness melted away in shock and joy. Jesus was alive! He was alive and had a message for his followers. "Peace be unto you: as my Father hath sent me, even so send I you". Jesus had just fulfilled his great commission from his Father. He had just completed his missionary term on earth and was now commissioning his followers to go out and repeat what He had just done. Christ's call was now their call. His mission was now their mission. As the Father had sent him, in the same way He was sending them.

How was Jesus sent by the Father? What can we learn from Christ's call that we can apply to world missions? What did the disciples understand Jesus to mean when He said, "even so send I you?" Here are some points to ponder.

### I. HE WAS SENT FROM ONE WORLD TO ANOTHER.

Jesus was a missionary, an ambassador of the Father sent from a celestial world to a terrestrial world. John 6:38 For Leame down from heaven, not to do mine own will, but the will of him that sent me. A missionary is one who crosses borders and enters new cultures. That is exactly what Jesus did and that was exactly what He wanted his disciples to do; to take the gospel to new lands, new tribes, and new cultures.

It is interesting to note that the word missionary cannot be found in our English Bibles. The word was first invented around 1598 when Jesuits began to evangelize in different parts of the world. The word comes from the Latin "mittere" which is used to translate the Greek word "apostello" which means set apart, to send out. This is the very word that Jesus uses in John 20:21when he said...as my Father hath sent me. We can interchange the Biblical word apostle for the modern day word missionary: both words mean to send out.

Missionaries are those who are sent out; called by God, commissioned by the church and controlled by the Spirit. According to tradition, nearly all of the disciples went on to preach the gospel in foreign lands. Andrew went to Scythia which is the region on the North Coast of the Black Sea which is present day Ukraine, Georgia, and Russia. Simon traveled to Libya and parts of Africa and later went on to Britain where he was crucified. James Alphaeus preached in Spain. Thomas preached to the Medes and Persians and later died in India. Bartholomew worked with Thomas in Asia Minor and also worked in Turkey. Matthew took the gospel to northern Iran and Matthias preached the gospel in present day Romania and Macedonia.

Jesus was sent from one culture to another, from one world to another. The disciples understood Christ's commission to mean preaching the gospel in foreign lands. We must realize our responsibility in sending workers to foreign fields and investing in world missions. It is not enough just to reach our "Jerusalem" we must reach the ends of the earth. The gospel is for all nations, all skin colors, all cultures and all peoples.

### II. HE IDENTIFIED WITH THE HOST CULTURE

Though Christ was sent from a much superior culture to an inferior culture he did not think of himself as better than everybody else. He shed his glory and splendor and put on human flesh. He was Emmanuel, God with us. He walked in our shoes, faced our temptations and identified himself with the human race. He was a missionary of missionaries. Philippians 2:8 And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross.

As Christians and especially missionaries, we must have the attitude of Christ. If we are ever going to win the world, we must do so with an attitude of humbleness. Even though we come from a culture that is way superior technologically, financially

and militarily, we must learn to identify with the host culture. Bragging of our superiority will never win the nations to Christ. However, a humble heart, a learner's attitude, and an appreciation for the host culture will break down barriers to be able to present Christ and the gospel.

### III. HE WAS ACCOUNTABLE TO A SENDER

In John 12:49-50 Jesus said, "For I have not spoken of myself; but the Father which sent me, he gave me a commandment, what I should say, and what I should speak. And I know that his commandment is life everlasting: whatsoever I speak therefore, even as the Father said unto me, so I speak" Jesus was sent by the Father and was accountable to the Father. He did not work independently. He obeyed the Father's command and submitted himself to the Father's authority.

We can see this model of missions in the book of Acts. Paul and Barnabas were commissioned by the church in Jerusalem and later returned to give a report of the work among the Gentiles. This kind of accountability helps to maintain the integrity of our ministry.


### IV. HE WAS SENT TO SERVE AND TO SAVE

Jesus summed up the reason why He was sent in Mark 10:45 For even the Son of man came not to be ministered unto,



but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many. Jesus came to serve and to save. He served the down and out, the hungry, the sick, and the needy. He also saved whosoever was willing to believe in Him as their Savior. This was His mission and now it is ours. We are sent out to serve a hurting world. Jesus said that every time we give a drink of water, every time we cloth the poor, whenever we visit those in prison and in the hospital, we do it unto Him. James said that if a man's faith does not produce good works then his faith is dead. We must be Christ's hands extended to the broken-hearted, his feet running to the down and out, and his voice speaking the gospel message of hope and salvation. We are here to serve and to save. Our job is to bring men and God together; to warn sinners of pending judgment, to teach men the commandments of God and to point those in darkness to the light of Christ.

All of these things the Father sent the Son to fulfill. He was sent to carry salvation from one world to another, to identify with the needs of the people, to be an example of accountability, and to serve and to save. As the Father had sent Him, Jesus is speaking today and saying, "So send I You"! 🛮





continued from page 9 are aggressive, and in the weeks following the accident our family re-lived the trauma of the accident multiple times as we whizzed in and out of traffic. (There is a reason the 2015 edition of the Guinness Book of World Records, lists the Dominican Republic as being the "Deadliest Place to Travel by Road.")

We began to pray that God would provide another vehicle, while trying to accept the fact that another vehicle might not be His will. As we prayed and searched for vehicles, we felt led to pursue another Suburban, as it best fits our needs as a family and for ministry. However, we could not find many Suburbans for sale, and shipping one from the US would add another \$10,000 dollars to the purchase cost. Only God could provide this need.

Several weeks later, God prompted the New Columbia God's Missionary Church to pledge \$10,000 towards replacing our vehicle. That announcement strengthened our faith, and we began to search in earnest. God blessed the faith and generosity of the New Columbia church and several other individuals, and their sacrificial giving resulted in an offering of over \$20,000.

On July 1, we located a 2007 Suburban in excellent condition with 67,000 miles for just under \$23,000 (including taxes and comprehensive insurance). On July 4, we finalized the purchase and drove away in our "new" vehicle.

We are humbled and overwhelmed with gratitude to the Lord for His material provision by which He also strengthened our faith, blessed those who gave and glorified Himself. We have already used our new Suburban for numerous ministry activities and believe that it is another confirmation that God will provide for the youth center too.



he message we find in John 20:21, "As my Father hath sent me, even so send I you," is considered by many to be the theme for Christian workers around the world. The phrase, "So send I you," has been quoted in countless missionary services, repeated in numerous sermons, and has been used in various poems and hymns focusing on ministry.

For many, these words compel them to leave friends and family and all that is familiar to them to serve God in a foreign land. For some, these words call them to be pastors, to lead, feed and nurture a congregation. For others, these words are a commitment to become Christian educators, teaching children and young people, using the Bible as the foundation of their curriculums. But sadly, this command from Jesus, fails to convey any particular message to scores of people who feel that these words don't apply to them.

As a child, I often heard people speak of being called into Christian service. Missionaries shared how they had heard God's voice telling them to go to a specific country to minister. Some gave

accounts of vivid dreams where God pointed them to a certain work. Others told of phenomenal ways that God communicated His will for their lives. So I assumed that if God wanted me in ministry, He would make this known in an extraordinary way. However, God directed me in a simple way through the words found in John 20:21, "As the Father has sent me, so send I you." As I read this passage of Scripture, I began to truly feel the great responsibility that I had to share the message of salvation to the lost. At that time I had no idea that God would direct my path to be a missionary in Romania or that He would lead me to minister to orphaned and needy field, shepherd a flock, or educate in a classroom. But we who have accepted Jesus as our Lord and Savior have the great responsibility to share the message of salvation to the lost. Therefore, we should strive to do what God has called us to do. He is sending us out into the world as His willing ambassadors.

Sadly, multitudes are not fulfilling the Lord's commission because they have a misunderstanding of what a calling is. One of my favorite quotes in regard to the true concept of a calling is from the founder of the Salvation Army.

"Not called!' did you say? 'Not heard the call,' I think you should say. Put your ear down to the Bible, and hear him bid tion, "So send I you?" It was a mandate for all the redeemed to share the gospel message to a lost and dying world. Masses are desperately in need of this glorious salvation and we have an obligation to share this good news. If we don't tell the people we come in contact with about the Gospel, then we're not fulfilling our mission or our calling.

Tragically, thousands of souls plunge into hell each and every day because God's people are not answering His call. We all have a great responsibility to tell the lost and perishing souls around us of their impending doom. It's imperative that we stand in the gap across the world, warning people, waving our arms, and

children. But I knew that from that day forward my life would never be the same.

When seeking God's will, there are times people will hear His voice, have vivid dreams or experience miraculous signs from above. Others may feel a gentle nudge or a pull, guiding them in the right direction. It's not as significant how God directs us, but that we follow God's direction.



When and where we share this message depends on how God leads us and how we respond to His leading. Not everyone is compelled to be in full time ministry. We will not all become missionaries on a foreign

If we truly contemplate the eternal destiny of our family, friends, neighbors, and all those with whom we come in contact, we will not hesitate to make an earnest attempt to win them

Our battle-cry should be: "Rescue the perishing, care for the dying, Snatch them in pity from sin and the grave; Weep o'er the erring one, lift up the fallen, Tell them of Jesus, the mighty to save. Rescue the perishing, care for the dying, Jesus is merciful, Jesus will save."

God has given us a commandment, "So send I YOU!" Have you accepted the challenge and answered the call? ☑



o send I you." These words reverberated with power and purpose, changing the course of the Apostles' lives forever. Lakes, nets and boats were swept aside in deference to this new purpose for living which would lead them far from the comforts of family ties, cultural acceptance and steady jobs. For even the simplest of needs they would be fully dependent on the same Jehovah Jireh (the Lord will provide) who had proved Himself trustworthy to Abraham centuries before.

Did God ever fail them?

NO! Of course not! It almost strikes us as sacrilegious or even heretical to ask that question. However, an honest evaluation of Paul's revelation in II Corinthians 11:23-27 may cause us to wince as we consider our understanding of God's provision. Paul reminded the Corinthian church that he frequently endured imprisonments, beatings, stonings, robberies, weariness, pain, sleepless nights, hunger, thirst, cold and nakedness.

We joyfully sing the chorus, "Where God Guides, He Always Provides." But, how often do we mistakenly equate that cliché to mean physical comfort and abundant material blessings? How do we respond when God's provision does not look like the American dream, but comes, instead, in the form of grace for the moment, His companionship in the time of suffering or the painful process of being conditioned as a soldier for the Lord? Reality and experience should remind us that this is often the case.

Nevertheless, while Paul had learned to be content in the difficult times, he was also grateful for the times of material blessing. The motive of his gratitude sprang from his desire that God's people would bear fruit through participating in the work of reaching the lost.

"But I rejoiced in the Lord greatly, that now at the last your care of me hath flourished again... Not that I speak in respect of want: for I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content. I know both how to be abased, and I know how to abound: every where and in all things I am instructed both to be full

and to be hungry, both to abound and to suffer need. I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me. Notwithstanding ye have well done, that ye did communicate with my affliction... Not because I desire a gift: but I desire fruit that may abound to your account." (Philippians 4:10-17, KJV)

On this account we, too, rejoice in God's provision.

Sixteen years ago we embarked on a missionary journey to the Dominican Republic trusting that God would provide for all our needs. However, shortly before we left, our plans to ship two motorcycles evaporated. We did not understand what God was doing. Had He failed us

> before we even left for the field? Not at all. It was a step in our journey of learning to follow God's direction and trust in Him. Three years later when God miraculously provided a 4x4 Suburban we were thrilled by His abundant provision. The children nicknamed it "The Jesus' Truck," and it served as a constant reminder to us of God's provision.

This past May we returned to the Dominican Republic to start a youth center. Two weeks later, a wild driver swerved across the median strip and hit us head-on. The impact spun us across the median strip and three busy lanes of oncoming traffic. Kim and I immediately cried out, "Jesus, help us!" As we jolted to a stop against the curb and the haze of the airbags cleared, we were overwhelmed with gratitude to find that no one in our vehicle had been injured. Jesus had indeed kept us safe. However, our Suburban was totaled.

In the Dominican Republic, justice does not always prevail. Neither the

other driver nor the policeman on duty filed the required accident report, so we were left with two options -- hiring a lawyer and pursuing a lengthy court battle or taking a total loss since the maximum insurance coverage available on our Suburban was collision. We chose the latter even though we were not prepared financially to purchase another vehicle.

Taxi service is readily available in the Dominican Republic, but it is more expensive than driving our own vehicle and greatly limits our freedom in ministry. Besides the cost, taxi drivers continued on page 5








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
